With only three days left in Canada's Third Victory Loan campaign, Prince Edward Island's grand total stands at \$1,504,200 according to figures released last night from Provincial Loan Headquarters. The Prince Edward Island is to maintain its enviable record, citizens of this province must subscribe \$245,800 to reach the annual objective, and many dollars more than that to keep pace with the rest of the Dominion.

For the purpose of the campaign the province was divided into three units. The division was by counties, Kings, Queens, and Kings. No American peace or appeasement advocate has been elevated to office. There is no anti-war party. The election only reaffirms at the source the national will for victory.

There is now no assurance of early Allied complete victory as there was in November, 1918, when another Democratic war president, Woodrow Wilson, saw his party majorities upset.

## Special Allied communique tells of Capture of 9,000 Prisoners; Nazi Second in command killed.

CAIRO, Nov. 4—(AP)—Marshal Erwin Rommel's Axis desert forces were in full and disordered retreat tonight across the sands of western Egypt, pursued relentlessly by British forces and under constant attack from above by British, Canadian, American and South African airmen.

A special Allied communique said Gen. Von Stumme, Nazi second-in-command, had been killed in the 12-day fight which preceded the flight of the "disordered columns" and 9,000 Axis prisoners had been taken, including Gen. Ritter von Thoma, commander of the Afrika Korps, and other topflight German and Italian officers.

## HEAVY AXIS LOSSES

The joint communique announced these tremendous Axis losses in less than two weeks of battle:—"Exceptionally high" casualties in dead and wounded; 600 planes; 260 tanks destroyed or captured; 270 guns and 50,000 tons of shipping laden with supplies.

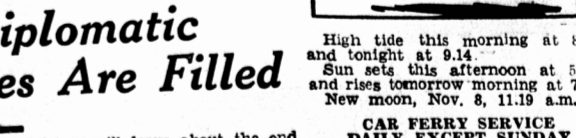
