Veteran Merchant At Wellington Dies At 98

Mr. Edouard T. Arsenault, probably the oldest living merchant in the Province and engaged actively until a short time ago in the business life of his firm, Arsenault and Gaudet, Wellington, died early yesterday morning at his home at the advanced age of over 98 years. He was born at Urbainville, Prince County, January 20th, 1850, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Chrysostome Arsenault. As a young man of 29 years he went to work as a clerk with the late Joseph B. Poirier, Tignish, who at that time was doing a thriving general store business in this West Prince village. After gaining some experience there, Mr. Arsenault in 1873 entered the employ of Mr. J.O. Arsenault (later Senator Arsenault) at Wellington, who was the father of the Hon. A.E. Arsenault, retired Justice of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island. After remaining with Mr. J.O. Arsenault for 23 years,

Mr. Arsenault in 1886 went into business for himself for the next eight years. In 1904 with Mr. E.F. Gaudet, Wellington, he formed the business firm now known throughout the Province as Arsenault and Gaudet. Until recent years he retained his active interest in athletics and enjoyed an interprovincial fame as a skater. Almost until the end he was in his store every business day and no neighbor could remember a Sunday when he was not seen in his pew in Misericorde Church, located four miles from his home.

His wife, the former Agnes Gaudet of Misericorde, died several years ago. Seven children were born of the union, two are still living, Edmund F. of Wellington and Mrs. Paul Perry (Albina) Egmont Bay. The funeral will be held on Friday morning from his late residence to Wellington Church at 9 o'clock. -S.
