Rev. J. E. Kelly 25 Years a Priest

(Kansas Exchange) On Feb. 2nd Rev. J. Edwin Kelly, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James J. Kelly of Fort Augustus, chaplain of St. Mary's Hospital, Charlottetown, had the distinction of reaching 25 years of priesthood. Reasoning and other restrictions now in force and the unsettled and chaotic conditions of the war period prompted Father Kelly to forego a public celebration on the occasion of his silver jubilee, so he passed the day taking care of his work as usual.

Father Kelly is a busy priest. He holds one pastorate and four chaplaincies. He is pastor of St. Mary's parish, Oxford; chaplain of St. Mary's hospital; chaplain of the huge, Strothen army air field, near Winfield; chaplain at the St. Dunstan's Cathedral, Charlottetown; and chaplain to all trainees in Southwestern college, Winfield. Thus, he has the unique distinction of holding five official appointments under two Bishops, his own Ordinary, the Most Rev. Bishop Christian Winfield, and the Most Rev. Bishop Joseph O'Hara, of Charlottetown. He is also vicar of St. Patrick's parish in Wichita, Kan. His 20-year pastorate in the North End was replete with pastoral achievements. An outstanding project was the building of the parish school. On June 23, 1941, he was appointed to the hospital chaplaincy in Winfield and to the Oxford parish in Ontario. Happiest congratulations are extended to Father Kelly who is so well beloved by his people. Father Kelly has three brothers and one sister on the island. Eugene Kelly, Charlottetown; Lacious O. Southport; Francis, Fort Augustus; and Mrs. Harry Kelly, Lake Verde. He also has one sister in the States, Sr. St. Joseph Eugene of St. Joseph's Order, St. Paul, who it will be remembered had the honor of celebrating her silver jubilee in 1940.

House Discusses Old Age Pensions

OTTAWA, March 13 — (CP) — Four announcements in the Commons today overshadowed the main business of the House—the continuing debate on the industrial development bill. Prime Minister MacKenzie King announced: 1. Decision of the federal government to lift restrictions on the supply of beer which may be released for sale by the provinces. 2. Revision of the wage control order modifying restrictions on granting wage increases and eliminating a proposal to enlarge the National War Labor Board. 3. The Canadian Government has informed the Eire Government that it is in full sympathy with the request of the United States Government for the closing of Axis legations in Eire. Defence Minister Ralston announced: 350,000 health survey report, which he tabled, meant that no country in the world had made a more complete study of its national health situation than Canada. When the announcements were completed, Stanley Knowles (C.P. Winnipeg North Centre) moved an amendment to the motion to go into committee of supply on the bank bill. His amendment recommended that the House record its opinion that consideration be given to increasing old age pensions and pensions for the blind, the lowering of the age at which pensions are payable and revision of pensions regulations. Mr. Knowles said there was urgency in that a Dominion - Provincial conference would be held soon at which changes in pensions laws might be considered. Even if the responsibility were placed on the federal government to provide pensions of \$40 a month at the age of 60 years the total annual cost would be only \$155,000,000, or \$85,000,000 less than the amount by which war expenditures are being reduced this year. Speaker J. A. Glen said provision for pensions was made in the estimates and the matter could be considered fully when they came before the House. He ruled the amendment out of order. Rising on a question of privilege at the opening of the sitting, Harry Leader (L. Portage La Prairie) said a reflection had been cast on him in the Manitoba Legislature when Attorney - General J. O. McLaughlin was reported as saying that when a layman made statements on a matter of scientific research of which he had no knowledge he was assuming "a great onus."

Discusses Cancer

Mr. Leader said that when he spoke in the Commons in February about the treatment given by Dr. J. R. Davidson of Winnipeg for cancer his remarks were based on facts as substantiated by medical authority. "and the reflection which I made upon medical gentlemen in Winnipeg was based on facts I had from men who should know. "I have no other object in view as a cancer patient, but to give something to the world that might help others, as Dr. Davidson has helped me." Speaking on the bank bill, Mr. Knowles said the C.C.F. group would support second reading. He had "misgivings" that the bill in present form would not give full effect to desirable principles on which it is based. The bank, which will have the purpose of aiding financing small and medium industry, will have resources of \$100,000,000. Mr. Knowles said the control and planning of investment and financial arrangements to get "socially desirable" goods produced "a terrible necessity" for Canadian welfare in the post-war period. Parliament was competent to control economics, business and industry in the same way as it dealt with matters now in its charge. It should be able to state the kind of things industry must produce.
