**SOURIS SEED FAIR**

The speaker held the attention of his audience while he gave them some practical tips on farming.

D. B. McDonald, North Belesque, pointed out in clear terms the necessity of agricultural education getting to the farms where it was most needed. He said that the meetings were a source of benefit only to the better class of farmers who look advantage of such gatherings and that the only way to reach those who were somewhat reluctant in this manner was to have experts visit their farms personally.

He was followed by Prof. Ross, who spoke on farm improvement and the necessity of keeping better stock. He showed in a concise manner that it required a return of twenty-five bushels of oats per acre to pay for the labor of sowing and harvesting; and to make any profit on oat raising is to have a large yield which can be done only by keeping the fertility of the soil in first-class order. He stated that P. E. Island is better adapted for dairying than any other line of animal husbandry.

Prof. Clark next spoke on how the prizes were awarded and the last speaker was Richard Creed, cats and barley; Prof. Clark, timothy, clover and wheat; Prof. Ross, potatoes and onions; T. A. Benson, poultry.

The fair came to a conclusion at 5.30 and was pronounced a banner one.
