Among the Sports.

Lord Hawke cricketers won their match at Cape Town with a representative eleven of South Africa, by an innings and 29 runs.

The Liverpool and Sheffield United football teams are having a hard time to settle their semi-final tie in the English Association series. They played two draws, 2 to 2 and 4 to 4, and were stopped early in their third meeting by the overflow of the spectators in the field of play. Thirty five thousand people were at the game, and the 12 policemen were powerless to keep them in the seating space.

The annual meeting of the Wanderers amateur athletic club was held Thursday night at Halifax. The financial statement showed a good year. The receipts were \$4,321, leaving a balance on hand of \$670. The chief items of income were as follows: Subscriptions \$1,890; Football \$1,315; Electric Sports \$345; Hockey \$518; E. A. Kirkpatrick, M.D. was elector president and F. P. Bligh secretary. Regarding the much mooted question of the charging ladies an admission fee as spectators of sports, a decision was reached that there be no charge for ordinary games, but that when a big event is on the matter of a charge be left to discretion of the committee. The new committee was instructed with the duty of taking steps to keep up the aquatic reputation of the club, it such should be deemed necessary of advisable.

Professor Archibald Sharp, a Fellow of the Royal Society of Great Britain, in a recent lecture, attempting to demonstrate by means of diagrams on a screen and by the recital of experiments that a cyclist does no work in fact pedaling but that the work is done on him, and that, as he thought that the muscle cells stored energy, a cyclist back-pedaling down hill would when he arrived at the bottom, be the fresher for the exercise.

It is announced that Arthur Zimmerman and Walter Sauger, the cyclist, have been matched to race in Milwaukee during the carnival week. Sauger has not been on the track for two years. He is engaged in the manufacture of handle bars. Zimmerman was at his best in 1893 and 1894 and won many victories. He retired soon after.
