—AGED RESIDENT DEAD—An old and respected resident of Nor-boro, has passed away in the person of Mr. John A. Harding, at the advanced age of eighty-eight years. His remains were laid to rest in Summerfield Cemetery, on Sunday, March 16th, and the funeral was largely attended.—E.

—PAINFUL ACCIDENT—A regrettable accident occurred at Glenwood on Thursday when Mr. Humphrey Oulton of that place sustained a broken leg. Doctors were immediately called and set the fractured limb and at latest reports he was resting comfortably as could be expected under the circumstances.—O.

—REASSURING NEWS—The ease and rapidity with which news travels in modern times was recently well demonstrated when a radio message sent out by Holman's at noon on Wednesday brought to anxious relatives and friends in Glenwood the news that Mr. Lyle Livingstone, who had been taken to the Prince County Hospital that morning had reached there in as good a condition as could be expected. Yesterday the same means conveyed the news that his condition remained unchanged. Considerable anxiety had been felt as to how he would endure the trip as it was necessary to take him over nine miles on a couch to O'Leary Station. He was accompanied to Summerside by his father, Mr. Charles Livingstone and the doctor. An X-ray examination showed that the rifle bullet with which he had been accidentally injured had passed through the lung and was lodged in the shoulder blade from which it will be removed later if necessary.—O.

—DEATH OF WELL KNOWN Former Resident of Malpeque—The death occurred early Sunday morning at his home in Kensington of Mr. Malcolm McGougan. The deceased was born in Malpeque and lived for many years in the McGougan stone house, which was built by his forefathers about 200 years ago when they came to the Island from Scotland. He was one of the most prosperous and progressive farmers of that district. He took an active interest in every thing which pertained to the welfare of the community. In politics Mr. McGougan was a very prominent Liberal. He was a lifelong member of the Presbyterian Church, an ideal citizen, who will be mourned by a very wide circle of friends in Summerside as well as Kensington and Malpeque. Five years ago he sold his farm and took up his residence at Kensington. There are left to mourn besides his sorrowing widow, one daughter, Lois wife of Elphalest Hébert of North Wiltshire and two sons, Keith, in Montreal and Alfred of Boston, Mass., who is at present at home, to all of whom the sincere sympathy of a wide circle of friends is expressed and in which the Guardian joins. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon and was very largely attended by friends from far

and near, many of whom were from Summerside.—
