MARCH REMINDERS

Examine your implements for worn and broken parts, with an eye to replacements. One of the things you ought to have in your tool-shed is an emery-wheel, or a small grindstone, which has countless uses. Get a wheel hose this season if the work was too much last year. Set pure-bred eggs if possible. Buy only pedigreed nursery stock.

Do not remove Winter protection from plants and fruit trees too early. Watch the incubator closely, the best of them may make a jump at some time. If you can't be sure of borrowing a sprayer at any moment, buy one now. See that land for fruit trees is rich or provide for enriching the same. Get some stable manure to the spot while the sleighs lasts.
