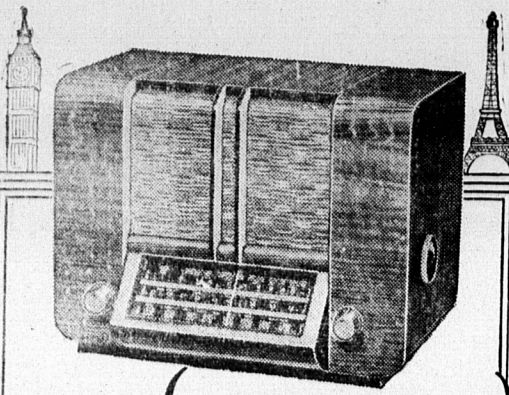

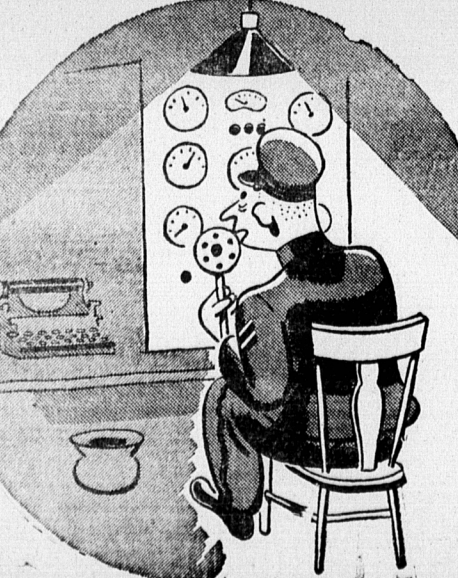

Daily War Survey

(By The Canadian Press) Prime Minister Chamberlain's announcement that the British troops in the Andalus area had been withdrawn leaves the status of the Norwegian campaign somewhat obscure. German pressure from the air no doubt was responsible for failure of the force landed at Andalus to accomplish what was expected of it.

The move apparently means abandonment of the proposed pincer movement against German-held Trondheim. As yet there is no indication as to whether this means a more intensified drive on Trondheim from the British base at Narvik to the north.

In the Andalus area British troops moved inland past the railway junction at Dombos where the railway line from Andalus to Oslo joins a line running north to Trondheim through Stora.

Coinciding with this restriction of the Allied land operations in Norway appears to have gone an intensification of naval activity against German supply and transport ships moving to Norway. British warships moved into the Kattegat to attack German craft.

In Appreciation

Sunday April 21st brought sadness and gloom to the Prince Edward Island boys in training at Fort Frontenac, Kingston, Ont. Gunner Dan Croucher after only a few hours illness passed to his eternal home. Dan was not only loved by his Island comrades, but his sunny disposition endeared him to all the boys of the R. C. A. and R. C. H. A. stationed at Kingston.

On Monday April 22 his remains were moved from the Military Hospital to the Cornelius Funeral Home on Princess Street where they were viewed by hundreds of soldiers and many citizens of the city.

On Wednesday morning at ten o'clock the funeral service was conducted in the Funeral Home by the Rev. Mr. Freeman of the 1st Baptist Church. After the service the casket was carried on the shoulders of his comrades to the Gun Carriage, and followed to his last resting place at Cataraqui by his soldier friends, many from Dan's old home in Prince Edward Island. At the grave the Guard of Honor was drawn up; most impressive were the firing party, three salutes were fired, a parting farewell to the young soldier. Three buglers then sounded the "Last Post."

The Military Service, while sad and impressive, is nevertheless beautiful; and that lovely April morning with the sun shining and not a cloud in the sky old earth taking on its mantle of green, the St. Lawrence flowing by blue as the Caribbean, must have left many a pang in the heart of the Island boys as they returned from Cataraqui Cemetery their comrade left behind.

The Juniors and Seniors being joint hostesses, the singing of the National Anthem brought a very successful annual meeting to a close.

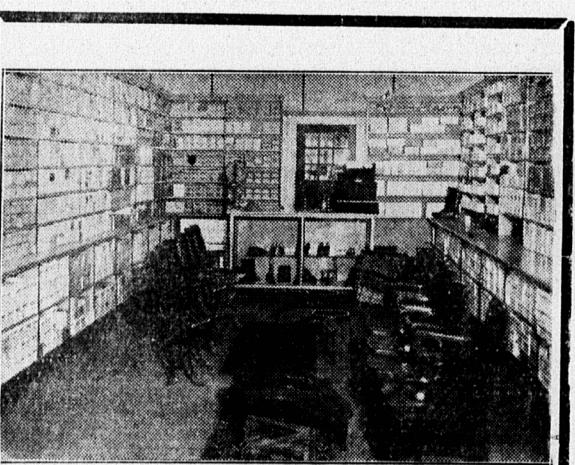
