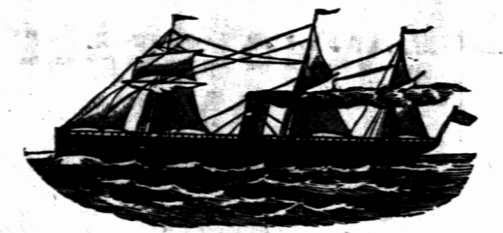

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Pope, on hearing of Bismarck's death remarked: "It is strange that my poor little body shows more resisting power than that of the giant of this century." The Pope has been long in feeble health, and such persons frequently outlive the strong and robust, quite contrary to the general expectation.

Col. John Jacob Astor set a worthy example to other millionaires when he volunteered for active service in the war. He has since given further evidence of patriotism and disinterestedness by asking the city government of New York to increase the taxes on his real and personal property.

Montreal Witness publishes the following despatch from Quebec: Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the other Canadian commissioners are reported to be very indignant at, and they have authorized a denial of, the reports in some of the Montreal papers regarding the probability of the Canadian preferential tariff being the chief obstacle to the successful termination of the conference and to the alleged determination of the American delegates to take the stand that the Canadian preferential tariff will have to go or the conference will end in nothing.

Montreal Star's Quebec telegram referring to the international conference, as noted in our issue of Saturday last, gives the impression that the Star, in its bitter opposition to the Laurier government, is more than willing that the conference should fail in its object. It is regrettable that the spirit of partyism should so far carry away a journal that professes political independence.

In the days of the elder William Pitt Canada was wrested from France and Havana and the Philippines from Spain. The king got rid of Pitt as premier and he was succeeded by Lord Bute who gave back Havana and Manila to Spain. The policy of surrender to enemies abroad was followed by the attempt to subvert the liberties of the people at home and in the colonies, which ultimately drove the American colonies into revolt and independence.

Starving on Stikine River.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 25.—[Special].—The Stikine route has given up another horror. J. Cassidy, direct from Stikine River, says that as the Stikine Nonto Cristo passed a point on the river it was hailed by two men from the bank. As the boat approached it was seen that the men were in a dreadful plight.

Cassidy jumped from the deck to the shore and stood aghast at the sight of two animated skeletons in front of him. One wore but a vest to cover his nakedness and the other a leg and a half of tattered trousers.

The two gray-haired shriveled forms were lifted on board tenderly. Lying in a comfortable bed they told their story with much difficulty, owing to swollen tongues and throats. They are named Jorden and are father and son. They belong in Seattle. The boy, gray-haired, wrinkled, and bent, is 19. The father is 50.

They had two years' provisions and were exploring a branch of the Stikine River. In navigating the rapids their boat was upset and they lost everything except what was on their backs. They could not go back, so they cut across the country, starving for sixteen days. For three days they had no food. On the fourth day they ate grass and the bark of young trees. On the fifth they devoured a nest of beetles and grass with dew on it. On the sixth, seventh, and eighth they lived on tree loads. On the ninth, tenth and eleventh they devoured every living insect they found. They came across a stream on the eleventh day. The young man said: "A she bear drank by our side with her cubs. We were so weak we did not dare anger her by killing the cubs. The bear stood two hours staring at us. For the next five days we were followed by wolves, which chased us from the stream. We lived on berries and insects.

"The wolves spurred us on to our last effort. In another day we would have been torn to pieces by the wild-eyed beasts, which tormented a circle around us, twenty or thirty of them every night, waiting till they judged us too weak to resist."

Mr. Cassidy says this is one of the many horrors the Stikine will produce. It is probable the old man cannot rally. Seattle, Wash., Aug. 22.—[Special.]—Since Forty Mile Circle City, and the other American creek diggings were deserted in 1896, when the miners stampeded for the Klondike, there has been no return stamped to the American side until this month. On Aug. 2, 500 men left Dawson in small boats headed for the north fork of Forty Mile, where rich discoveries have been made.

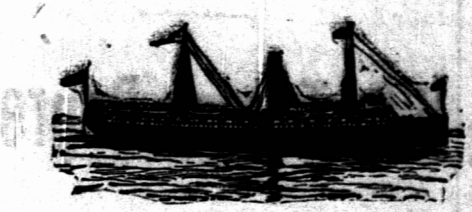
George Alexander of Dungeness, Wash., who returned on the Dirigo, said, "There was a great excitement just before we left Dawson over a reported strike of great richness on the north fork of Forty Mile. "Forty Mile is a lone creek. Before the Klondike discovery most of the work was done on the south fork. The diggings were considered good enough before the days of Eldorado and Bonanza. The old timers looked for discoveries to be made this year on the north fork, and it looks as if some one had struck it."
