THE MARKET.—The Charlottetown market was very well attended yesterday and in spite of the uncertain weather many people drove to town. Prices, in most cases remained the same as the previous market day. The fish market was kept busy in the morning. Mackerel sold at from 20 to 25 cents each and Codfish at 5. Feedstuff was dull and there was practically nothing doing in that line.

TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIPS.—If the weather is favorable a start will be made early next week with the provincial lawn tennis championships, for which it is expected that there will be a large number of entries. The games will be played on the clay courts of the Abegweit A.A. Some work is to be undertaken to prepare these courts which the unpropitious weather has hampered, otherwise the tournament might have been already commenced. The championships will consist of Men's Singles and Men's Doubles, and it is likely that there will also be a Mixed Doubles competition. The present Singles champion for the province is Mr. W. Matheson, but he is not in the Island now to defend the title. Messrs. H. E. Rice and L. B. McMillan are the holders of the Doubles Championship.

THE LIGHTING QUESTION.—In connection with the proposal of the City Council to take over the electric lighting and power plant of the Charlottetown Light and Power Company, for which the Council, subject to the approval of the citizens, has made an offer of \$96,000, Mr. Wright, a highly recommended electrical engineer of Halifax, is at present in the city engaged in inspecting and making a valuation of the company's plant and fittings in the interests of the city. The city auditors are also examining the company's books. The results of these examinations will be laid before the meeting of citizens which it is proposed to hold on Monday night for the purpose of deciding whether the Council's offer for the purchase of the business should be ratified.
