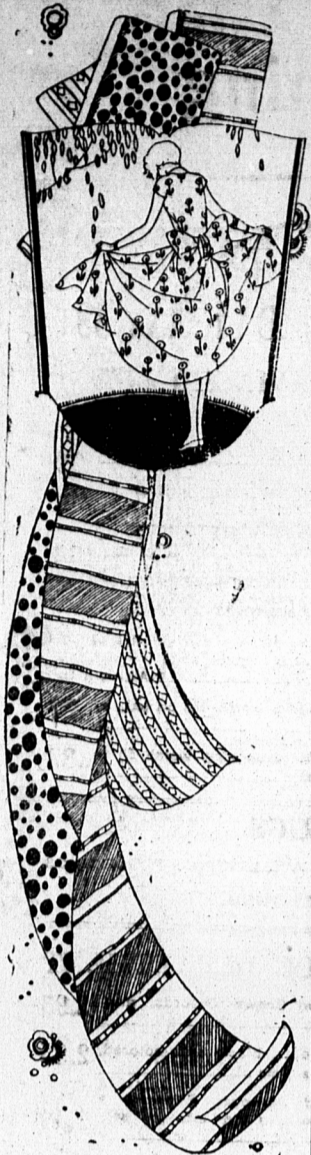

—RETURNED FROM SYDNEY.—Mr. W. B. McNeill of Summerside, who loaded his schooner the "Lady Hill" with produce and went to Sydney to sell the cargo, returned on Saturday evening. The prices realized for hay, oats and potatoes were better than last year's—probably on account of fewer cargoes entering the port. Mr. McNeill reports the strike situation quiet, but destitution of absolute poverty apparent. The remittance money is given to the striking miners in a system of "doles," twice a week. A conference between the leaders of the U. M. W. and the British Empire Steel Co. was held on Friday, but resulted in a deadlock—each party still holding out. Seventy-five per cent of the miners appear to be willing to go to work the other militant twenty-five per cent still dominates the miners. Clergymen are exhorting the miners to attend the meetings of the unions and register their votes for a resumption of work. The end of the strike appears to be in sight. Mr. McNeill had the pleasure of seeing the Blue-nose and the Haligonian in Sydney harbor, "runners up" for the international schooner speed championship. K.

Miss Mary Corrigan, sister of the bride, was bridesmaid, and Robert Durgin was best man. The bride wore rose color crepe de chine with hat to match and carried a bouquet of bridal roses. The bridesmaid wore lawn colored crepe de chine and hat to match.

—NAUFRAGE HARBOUR—This port is a stirring place—a small town—this summer, with an estimated population of 160 people, young and old, who during the winter there was but the one solitary family, light-keeper McKinnon. A fishing village the growth of the lobster industry where there are four canneries in the harbour's mouth and around the piers, while the mackerel and codfish business follow up at the end of the lobster season. The number of shacks and small fishermen's dwellings make up the village with the four cook houses and lodging quarters of the canneries. All parts of the island contribute to the spring and summer population, Egmont Bay, in Prince County being the most largely represented where people are employed almost exclusively by the Portland Packing Co. in its big cannery and fish-preserving plant. The local Catholic Church finds it necessary to have two Masses to accommodate the largely increased congregation. There are two stores at Naufrage, catering to the needs of the people. Mr. Gallant, merchant at St. Charles, has a branch store opened up here this spring, while Mr. Angus McKinnon a local farmer producing lots of cream, has opened up an ice-cream parlour, where he manufactures his own ice cream and dispenses it with other soft drinks, candy and general supplies. The lobster factories are doing a moderate business averaging 200 to 400 lbs. per boat, operating 350 traps with two men. The weather all season has been unusually calm, with the exception of last week when it stormed and only two hauls were made. It is thought that this stormy spell will stir up the fish and cause them to trap more plentifully. Codfish is very plentiful but few are trying to catch them. At North Lake harbour they are making very large catches of cod, and quite a few are after them.—Grain sowing is about finished along the shore. No much crops is being put in.
