ST. JAMES CHURCH

Mrs. Mary Cass Laid To Rest On Saturday

The funeral of the late Mrs. Mary Cass from her late residence in North River on Saturday, Oct. 22nd, was largely attended. The funeral service was held in the St. Dunstan's Basilica and the funeral Mass was celebrated by Rev. J. V. Cass, S. J., a son of the deceased, assisted by Rev. Louis Dougan, Deacon and Rev. R. G. Ellsworth, D. D., subdeacon. Coincident with the Requiem High Mass another Requiem Mass was celebrated at a side altar by Rev. Frederick Cass, another son of the deceased.

Final absolution was pronounced by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan. Seated in the sanctuary were Rt. Rev. Monsignor G. J. MacLellan, V. G., and Rt. Rev. Justice McDonald, the latter being a former pupil of the late Mrs. Cass.

Also present in the Sanctuary were the rector and faculty of St. Dunstan's University, the Missionary Passionist Fathers, the members of the Basilica staff, and a large number of the clergy from various parishes throughout the diocese. Special music was rendered by the choir assisted by Rev. Bernard Gillis, D. D., under the direction of W. J. Brown.

Services at the grave were conducted jointly by Rev. J. V. Cass, S. J., and Rev. Frederick Cass. Four caskets of the deceased — Parvin, Austin, Francis and George acted as pall-bearers, while the honorary pall bearers were: Dr. I. E. Croken, Messrs. Daniel McNeill, Vincent Blake, Leo Doyle, George Berrigan and Leo P. Macdonald.

An exceptionally large number of Mass Cards and floral offerings were tangible evidences of the sincere regret occasioned at the passing of the late Mrs. Cass. May her soul rest in peace.

Death Of Mr. John B. Connolly On Saturday

Mr. John B. Connolly, 78, retired Charlottetown man died at his home Saturday after a long illness. A native of this City he was formerly employed by the firm of MacLean Bros. and later by Bruce Stewart & Co. when that firm took over the MacLean stand. Mr. Connolly retired about 10 years ago. For a quarter century he was prominently connected with Charlottetown's Fire Department retiring six years ago with the rank of Captain.

Mr. Connolly was a faithful member of the local Council Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society and a former member of the Benevolent Irish Society.

Surviving are his wife, nee Martha Hennessey and five sons and two daughters. John J. Connolly, Lieutenant Commander of the local R. C. N. V. R. and Leonard, Charles, Austin and William Connolly, all of this City, are sons, while Sister St. Magdalene, Charlottetown Hospital and Miss Gladys Connolly at home are daughters.

Two sisters also survive, Mrs. Flora Bridge, and Mrs. J. M. Haynes, both of Medford, Mass. The funeral will be held from the late residence of the deceased, 95 Kent Street, Tuesday morning at 8:45 to St. Dunstan's Basilica thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery.
