THE MARKETS—The market yesterday was well attended all commodities of the season being well supplied and retailing as follows: Blueberries, 25c qt.; Raspberries, 40c qt.; gooseberries, 25c qt.; black currants, 30c qt.; butter 42 to 45c lb.; eggs 45c dozen, onions, 8c lb.; cabbage, 8c head, beets 5c bunch, cauliflower, 5 to 25c head butter beans 10c lb., peas 25c quart, fowl \$1.25 to \$1.75 pair, cod 8c lb. The buyers prices for staple produce remains unchanged from last quotations.

ISLANDER IN CHARGE—Down on the Bras d'Or Lakes, in Cape Breton, where Dr. Alexander Graham Bell has a summer home and where he has been conducting many experiments, is a new one in women labor. Prof. Bell has started a boatbuilding plant and he has as far as possible employed women to do some of the work. In charge of the plant is Walter Pinard, formerly of Charlottetown, whose father was a well known boat builder, and under his supervision about fourteen young women and a number of men for the harder parts of the work, and for instruction purposes are at work on dories and lifeboats which will be used by the navy. Already about fourteen of these boats have been completed and they have been tested and found to be up to the standard in every respect. The girls like the work and are as happy as the day is long. They feel that they are doing something useful and that is of practical value.

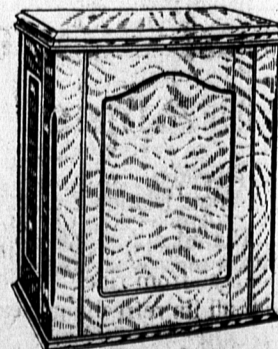
