claim to be described as a World Empire which none other could put forward. For, wherever the British flag floated, it assured equal opportunities and equal freedom to the peaceful activities of all nations. It was in no such sense that William Pitt the Younger, the German World Power. For him the term connoted dominion. He has, indeed, often talked of Germany's "place in the sun," but it was a place not to be wrested from them by other nations, but to be wrested from them by the menace, if not by the actual use, of force. This much only may be said in extension of his policy, namely, that the nation was a late comer in the competition for place in the sun, and to create, within a short lifetime a World Empire which only be built up by the operation of great national forces working steadily through centuries of effort, force may well have seemed to him the only available means. Did he ever count the cost? Did he ever realize that the striving after world dominion would some day bring him into armed collision with the other great powers of the States I have just mentioned as having already established some claim to be described as World Empire?

### PATRIOTISM AND PRODUCTION

On Friday evening Mr. Richard Creed addressed an Agricultural Conference in the school at Avondale on Patriotism and Production. After pointing out the dependence of the United Kingdom on foreign countries for food supplies he went into the question of meat production fully taking cattle as representing our meat producing animals. He pointed out that the supply of beef has not at all kept pace with the increasing population. In ten years the population of Canada increased 34 per cent, while the cattle population increased 17 per cent. Further, the urban and consuming population increased in ten years 62 per cent, while the rural or producing population only increased 10 per cent. Putting it another way in 1901 and again in 1911 the number of cattle per head of rural population was a little over 1/2. The number of cattle per total population was, however, 1 in 1901 and only 9-10 in 1911. Take the ratio per total population for 1901 according to that of 1911 it would require nearly a million additional cattle. There was a great increase in the number of hogs marketed in 1914. This whole increase, however, was in the West. If we turn to the World's supply we will remember that Denmark and Belgium produced for export about \$7,000,000 worth of bacon, so that there is likely to be a great shortage this year so that our farmers will make a very big mistake if they did not increase their swine breeding to their utmost extent. The receipts of swine per total population, but there is ample room for further development. The outlook for 1915 is particularly bright. The soldiers at the front must have meat, and a great many of the cattle Germany, France, Belgium and Holland are already slaughtered. The scarcity will be felt much more keenly now that the war is broken out. We, in P. E. Islands should do our part, and since we cannot increase the number of Live Stock within the next year we should feed them and care for them in the best possible way. At the close of Mr. Creed's address a discussion was taken part in by the chairman Rev. P. D. McGuigan, John Frasier, Michael Reid, Patrick O'Donnell, Joseph Fraser, A. J. O'Keefe, and others. All of these speakers seemed to appreciate the importance of the food supply question, and Avondale, will without doubt do its part during the coming year. Mr. Creed will speak at Kelvin on Wednesday; at Coleman on Thursday; at Glenwood on Friday; at Central Lot 16 on Saturday.
