OPENING OF RIFLE SHOOTING SEASON

ISLAND AFFAIRS IN PARLIAMENT

minister is asked a question, the courtesy of the House allows him to make a reply.

Mr. McLEAN (Queen's, Prince Edward Island): I am going to make a few remarks notwithstanding the objection of the member for Pictou. As I understand it, the railway system of Prince Edward Island will be connected by means of this car ferry with the intercolonial railway system on the mainland, and that will be a fulfilment of the terms of Confederation which require continuous communication between the Island and the mainland. The car ferry will be regarded, as I understand it, as so many miles of railway, and the Prince Edward Island railway will, when the car ferry is in operation, be simply a section of the intercolonial railway. That is the arrangement, which as I understand it, is made by the Government with the people of Prince Edward Island, and such an arrangement will be carried out when the car ferry is established. I am glad the minister is able to tell us this system will be completed on the 1st day of August, 1914. We have looked for it for many years; ever since Confederation, practically. We have asked the successive Governments of Canada to fulfil the terms of Confederation in this regard, but until the present Government came to power we have been unable to get anything. There have been three short hauls to connect with the mainland, which has been a great expense and disadvantage to the people of the Island in the past, and when this car ferry is in operation, it would practically mean one haul and the people of the Island will be put on an equal footing in that respect with the people of the mainland. That is only due to the people of the Island and it is nothing more than fulfilling the terms of Confederation. The people of Prince Edward Island have just as much right to this car ferry as the people of the mainland have the right to have filled, in any gap between two parts of the same line of railway. I cannot see any reason why the contention should be raised that there should be any extra charge for the car ferry service than if the freight were carried just the same number of miles on a section of the intercolonial railway.

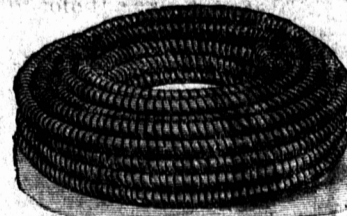
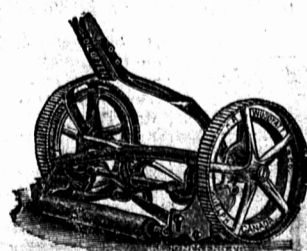
