Brennan, managing editor of the Journal and Agriculturist, of Summerside, is attending the annual convention of the Maritime Air Club, which is being held in New Glasgow this week. Mr. Brennan went as Summerside's representative, being appointed as such at an informal meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade. —SPECIAL SESSION OF SUPREME COURT—There was a special session of the Supreme Court at Summerside last week. Mr. Justice Saunders, presiding. Two cases were heard. The first was the suit of Russel Rogers plaintiff against Sanford Phillips and others defendants. This was an action on a promissory note of \$1,000 given by the defendant to the plaintiff. Judgment was entered for the plaintiff for the sum of \$1,092.00 and interest on said note together with the cost of suit. Mr. E. H. Strong K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. George Matthews for the defendant. The second case was the suit of Thomas A. Campbell, K. C., against Genevieve MacNally. Judgment by default had been entered some time ago by the plaintiff against defendant for the sum of \$80.55 being amount of account claimed by the plaintiff against defendant. This was an application made by the defendant to set aside the default judgment. After hearing several witnesses for the plaintiff as well as the defendant, the application was refused. Mr. Campbell appeared in person and Mr. C. D. MacCallum for defendant.—S.

—DEATH OF FORMER POSTMASTER OF STANLEY BRIDGE. They lay in state on Friday night at the Prince County Hospital. Mr. John MacLeod of Stanley Bridge at the advanced age of 85 years. Mr. MacLeod entered the hospital about eight days ago for treatment. Mr. MacLeod was for 37 years the very efficient and most highly esteemed Postmaster at Stanley Bridge and many friends will regret to learn of his passing. He was a staunch member of the Presbyterian Church and one of the most highly esteemed residents of the district. His wife predeceased him a few years ago. cause they will have to give up some privileges which they enjoy at the present time. There is however, one thing I can say for our farmers in this respect and that is that they have always been prepared to make sacrifices personally whenever they have been convinced that co-operative selling was in the interests of all, and I feel sure in this connection that they will be prepared to give the same co-operation as they have given in the past. But there is one difficulty which I see. Under present conditions in the province, very often we have United States buyers coming in the summer months. They look over the growing crop and if they see some exceptionally good fields of certified seed potatoes which they would like to buy they will desire to buy these direct from the grower. In other words, they take an option on the crop. Possibly the price is set at 75 cents per bushel and they pay 25 cents per bushel down, the balance to be paid when the crop is delivered in the fall. Whether the grower who has been in the habit of doing this will be prevented from continuing the practice is more than I can say, but it would seem that if the whole province came under the operation of this marketing bill then all the potatoes would have to be sold through the one marketing organization.

There is a similar situation in connection with the fisheries. We have some small co-operative fishery unions which handle to a small extent the product of some of the factories. Whether the big dealer who has been backing the fishermen for a great many years and building up an individual trade will be injured in any degree should the fishermen adopt the scheme I cannot say; I do not know whether he would be willing to come under the act.

I may point out that in addition to the Potato Growers' Association, which is a very large organization in that province, we have another quite considerable organization, the Associated Shippers, and there are also large private firms which advance the potato grower his fertilizer and possibly seed for putting in his crop. Under local legislation there has been evolved a plan whereby these men can be protected through what is known as the first mortgage plan with respect to crop. The mortgage on the crop is intended to protect the man who advances fertilizer and seed to the grower, and it provides that the crop must go to the person making such advances. Personally I should not like to see anything done that would interfere with the rights of these men, because our farmers cannot carry on very well without their assistance. If there are no compulsory features in the bill, as the minister said yesterday, I think it is all to the good.

Mr. Weir (Melfort): May I interrupt? I think the hon. gentleman is mistaken when he says that I give the impression that there were no compulsory features in the bill.
