A NEWFOUNDLAND despatch says:—Heavy falls of snow are reported during the past couple of days along the railway line in the island. The incoming express on the last trip went through an average fall of nine inches between Bay St. Islands and Channel. Near Bay St. George a bank over two feet deep was ploughed through for some distance. The train on her arrival at Channel presented a mid-winter appearance, being completely snowed over.

THE death is announced at Boston of Murdoch MacKenzie, aged 22, son of Jas. and Mrs MacKenzie, Bradalbane. The deceased was taken ill with appendicitis on Sept 27th and passed away the same day. The death is made doubly sad by the demise of his brother Alexander which called him home ten months previously. The body was taken home and interred at Hartsville where services were impressively and feelingly conducted by Rev. Mr. Seller. The pallbearers were John A McLeod, John A Matheson, Hugh McLeure, Donald McLennan, Edward Ross, and Roderick McKay.

A SPORTSMAN'S NUMBER. The November Canadian Magazine is almost a sportsman's issue. Edwyn Sandys, a Canadian who won fame on Outing and who is the author of several sporting books, contributes a witty and informing story of a day's wildfowling in Manitoba. Professor Roberts, whose animal books are well known, describes a bird tragedy under the title "The Terror of the Air." Castair Dickson has an account of the semi-animal migration of the caribou, the most plentiful of Canada's fast-disappearing big game. This is illustrated by J. W. Boatty. W. A. Fraser, that prince of short story writers, has a collier story which is both dramatic and touching. Besides these animal stories, Joseph J. Clark writes most entertainingly about Golf in Canada, mingling his history with humorous descriptions.

ROBERT B. MANTLE, whose fine acting will be remembered by Charlottetown theatre-goers, is at present appearing in New York in a round of Shakespearean and other roles. His Richelieu is receiving high praise from the critics, one of them saying: "The Richelieu of history took the stage of the Garden theatre last evening. It is not too much praise for Robert B. Mantle to say that he vivified one of the greatest characters in the world-drama with fidelity, and did not mar the portrayal by subordinating the historic figure to the whims of the actor. The cardinal-duc was shown vividly. There were the high lights of his statesmanship, the littleness of his craftiness, the mightiness of his power, the feebleness of his body, the love of power, and yet greater love of France, and the self-sacrifice in behalf of the honor and happiness of his ward. In none of these varied elements of the picture did Mantle fail to ring true, and his audience dispersed with a profound and true impression of the real Richelieu."
