A NARROW ESCAPE.—About half past two on the evening of Monday the farm residence of Mr. Bruce Deacon at North Wiltshire was discovered to be on fire by Mrs. Deacon, who was home alone at the time with her little child. She called to one of the neighbours, Mr. Glover, who was passing. Word was passed to Mac by Bruce Deacon who telephoned to the station agent, Mr. Monaghan. A special train happened to be coming along at the time. Mr. Monaghan wrote a note and gave it to the conductor who threw it among the snow showers that were working in a cutting near the station. The gang of shovellers, about 40 in all, rushed to the scene taking their shovels with them, and these together with about 60 neighbours made up a fire fighting force of 100 men. While the volunteer salvage corps were busy getting on the furniture, even taking out the windows and taking off the doors, neighbours who had fire extinguishers were telephoned to by Mrs. Aquilla Bowman. The cheese factory, where there was a supply of chemical for the extinguishers, was also notified. In the course of time a number of hand extinguishers arrived, and as the contents were emptied they were replaced by the supply received from the cheese factory. There was also a bucket gang in action. The snow shovellers were kept busy throwing snow on the flames. Another gang was on the roof cutting holes and pouring water. As a result of the combined efforts of these workers the building was saved, although damaged to the extent of between five and six hundred dollars. Mr. James G. MacLeod, of Hampshire, who drove three miles to the scene of the fire, says that he had seen the big fire at Chelsea and Salem, and believes that the firemen there did not work harder than the group of volunteer fire fighters at Wiltshire Tuesday.

Conference of United Church in the Maritimes

The Executive Committee of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada met in the Board Room of the University Residence at Sackville, N. B., on Tuesday, January 26th at 1 p. m., with Principal Clarence MacKinnon, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair. The meeting was called to consider the date of the next Conference, and in view of the meeting of the General Council at Montreal on June 10th and the advisability of waiting until the findings of the Council are to hand, it was decided to hold the next meeting of the Maritime Conference at Sackville from August 31st to September 3rd.

into Scottish hands. Rival Companies sprang up, led by men with the names of MacGillivray, Cameron, MacFalls, Alexander MacKenzie, Roderick MacKenzie, Fraser, Finlay, Campbell, Ballantyne, and many other Scottish names. They bought many as well as fortune and made of them attainment of the grange Montreal, the river that bears his name, and achieved the distinction of being the first white man to cross the Rockies north of Mexico, and view from them the Pacific Ocean. Another Scotsman, who was distinguished by his efforts to colonize the west, was Thomas Douglas, Lord Selkirk, and the lecturer told of the struggle he had, first to overcome the opposition of the trading companies, and when that was done to bring out and establish the settlers, giving them a means of livelihood, lastly to protect them from the inroads made by hunger and violence and the attacks of forces instigated by fur trading companies who were convinced that the success of the colony would eventually mean the destruction of the fur trade. Sir George Simpson was still another Scotsman prominently connected with the Hudson Bay Company whom the lecturer spoke of as a leader who did much to bring peace and order into the North West. James Douglas, of the same clan as Selkirk, he said was the most prominent figure in British Columbia's colonial period, and remarkable among many remarkable men. In time he became governor of the colony.

It was not until 1857 that the truth about the fertility and resources of this part of Canada became common and a real attempt was made to promote colonization, some far-seeing men recognizing the possibilities of having so large and rich an area lying vacant, where neighboring countries could cast covetous eyes upon it. Their request was granted and incorporated in the Canadian Constitution in 1870. A new branch of the Canadian service, the Department of the Interior came into being in 1873, and Hon. David Laird, Maritime Conference has thus far subscribed \$378,578.00 towards its objective of \$3,750,000 for the maintenance and Extension Fund, and that strenuous efforts were being made to reach the objective in full within the next two months. the average business man should be content to let things work out now, attend to his own affairs and not interfere in national politics. Above he will find enough evidence of the rottenness of our national conditions, not in the Liberal party, but in the way it is being handled by some of those who at present have control.

Mr. Sinclair next asks us to name a man and party who we think could accomplish our ideals. As things are at Ottawa today with the Liberals in control, we submit, first the Speaker, Hon. Mr. Lemieux; next, Hon. Mr. Robb. We believe that either of these men, or between them, given a free hand, could reorganize the Liberal party and the Govt. of Canada and carry with them the respect and confidence not only of all good Liberals but of Conservatives as well, and they would have the cordial support of The Financial Post, if they would get about them as we are sure they would, leading Liberals who, like themselves, would put country before party. We understand that Mr. Robb, in spite of his handicaps, will, if he is allowed to, present this year a financial statement that will be a very agreeable surprise to the nation and reflect great credit on his own political sagacity.

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It was also directed that the Settlement Committee as constituted by the Presbyteries and Conference of last year be called to meet at Sackville, N. B., on Thursday, May 20th, 1926 for the transaction of such business as may come before it. This will mean that all ministers or charges desiring or planning to change this summer should notify the chairman of the Settlement Committee before that date. The following important resolution was passed by the committee: "The Executive of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada, taking cognizance of an announcement that an amendment to the United Church of Canada Act in New Brunswick would be asked for at the ensuing session, would put itself on record as being opposed to having the questions involved reopened by the Legislature of the Province, inasmuch as it would only tend to continue the ill feeling that has already been stirred up by this controversy." The Committee agreed to invite Rev. S. D. Chowan, D. D., General Superintendent of the erstwhile Methodist Church, to be the speaker at the Conference Communion service. The following were appointed representatives of the Board of Religious Education, Revs. B. J. Porter and G. W. Tilley.
