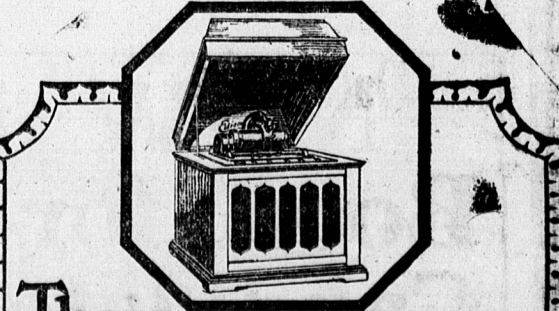

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, July 17.—A fair amount of business continues to be done in eggs for local consumption and the market was moderately active, with no change in prices to note, supplies of all grades being ample to meet the requirements. The receipts were 1,742 cases, as compared with 2,078 for the same day last week and 1,349 for the corresponding day a year ago. We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Specials 43c, to 44c. Extras 39c, to 40c. No. 1, candled stock 34c, to 35c. No. 2, candled stock 31c, to 32c. There was no improvement in the demand for maple product and the market was dull, with no new features to note. The offerings on spot are not large and prices run fairly steady, with maple syrup quoted at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per tin of one gallon, and maple sugar at 15c, to 20c, per lb., as to quality. The trade in old crop potatoes continues full owing to the fact that buyers generally are filling their wants with new crop stock, of which receipts are ample at the city markets to draw from, therefore old crop Green Mountains are little enquired for and are nominally quoted at 50c, and Quebec stock at 45c, per bag of 90 lbs.
