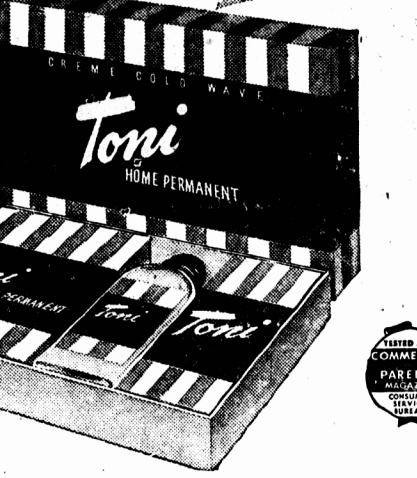
Thanksgiving Day
