**Returns From London And Paris Fox Fur Sales**

—Mr. John S. Wright returned on Tuesday night from London and Paris where he attended the fur sales. He called from Southampton on the S. S. Megantic to Quebec. The passage was stormy and fog held up the steamer for two nights off the coast of Newfoundland.

—Mr. Wright states that the silver fox industry is holding its own and in a year or two will recover from the present situation. As the poorer grades of skins are called out the demand for higher grades will come back.

At present the working girls in the European countries and the British Isles are realizing their ambition and are wearing silver fox furs that can be obtained for about \$40 or \$50. This has caused the decline in the better class of furs. Mr. Wright was very optimistic in regard to the silver fox industry, which would be back on a sound business basis in the near future.

The Paris sales, which were held on April 21st, were very good. The Association sold all their offering at fair prices.

In London the first sale put on was the Hudson Bay Co. There were 10,000 fox skins put up. The Association had no skins in this offering. Lampons sale on May 11 had 13,000 fox skins to offer. At this sale the Association sold a large percent-
