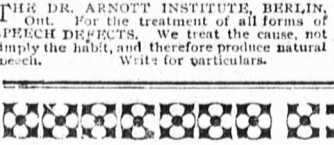

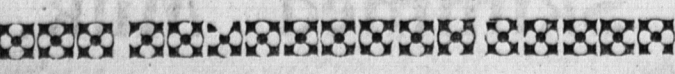

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.
House met at 5.30

Hon George E. Hughes submitted a bill to amend the Act of Incorporation of the Baptist Church which was read a first time and set down for second reading tomorrow.

Mr Mathieson, Mr Wood and Mr Morson asked Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of this House the reports and returns of Road Inspectors for the several Road districts of Prince County, Kings County and Queen's County respectively for the past year.

The Commissioner submitted the reports of the three counties for the coming year and stated that the reports of last year were in the Public Works Department.

Mr. Mathieson wanted further information and Hon. Mr. Cummiskey contended that the statute passed some years ago prevented bringing original returns before the House but only a copy which would in this case require months to make.

Mr Mathieson in the absence of Mr. Fraser asked the Hon. the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of this House a statement showing in detail:

1. Total amount expended on the Bridges of this Province by public competition during the year ending December 31st, 1904.

2. Were any sums of money paid to the Road Inspectors during the said year in addition to their salaries as such Road Inspectors, if so state the names of such Inspectors, the amount paid to each, and the nature of the work for which the same were paid respectively.

The Commissioner said all bridges of any importance were let by tender or public sale with the exception of one or two such as the Morell Bridge and some that might break down and had to be repaired at once. With regard to payments there were no sums paid except where the Inspectors acted as specially appointed inspectors of the contracts in the absence of any others.

House adjourned at six o'clock.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON
House met at 11.50.

Mr. Mathieson asked the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of the House a statement showing in detail how the following amounts which appear by the Public Accounts to have been expended on Morrell New Bridge: K. Webster and William Compton \$182.50, W. J. Anderson \$81.80, H. Coffin and H. Webster \$25.47, also \$15.82 paid R.N. Cox on Floating Bridge. At what rate or different rates per day were the workmen on the new Bridge paid? Was there more than one rate of wages and if so why?

Hon. Mr. Cummiskey said the statement required a large amount of labor but the statement would be prepared.

Mr. Kichham asked the Commissioner of Public Work if it is the intention of the Government to open a new road or repair the old road on the north side of Bay Fortune.

Hon. Mr. Cummiskey replied that the road would have been opened but that one of the men who had agreed upon a price for his land afterwards refused to accept the offer he had previously made.

Mr. McMillan asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government to open the new road between the West River Road and South Shore Road this coming summer.

Hon. Mr. Cummiskey replied that he had visited the locality in company with the two representatives and saw the road was badly needed. During the recess a further investigation would be made and probably an agreement would be come to with the owners of the land.

Hon. Mr. Peters submitted the report of Public Schools.

A bill to incorporate the P. E. I. Development and Tourist Association was read a third time and passed.

The House, on motion of Hon Mr. Simpson, resolved itself into a committee of the whole on the bill to incorporate Clinton Hall Co which was agreed to.

The House resumed committee with Mr. Arsenault in the chair, in the absence of Dr Warburton, on the bill to provide for the consolidation of the public debt.

A bill to amend an act respecting assignments was read a third time and passed. The House adjourned at one o'clock.

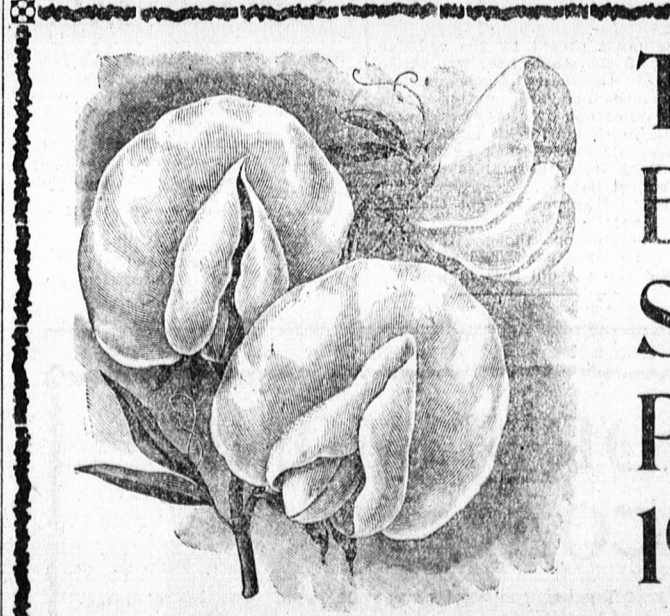
