**Upholds Government's Prohibition Enforcement**

**Mr. L. R. Allan Speaks On Draft Address In Defense Of Present Administration.**

Provincial Legislature, March 17. Afternoon Session.

Following, Dr. McMillan on the Draft Address, Mr. L. R. Allan, Fifth District of Prince, complimented the mover and seconder of the Address. He thought the mover more deserving of credit; the seconder like himself depended too much upon manufacturing or making his reply as he went along, whereas the mover said what he had to say and sat down.

It is pleasing to know, Mr. Allan continued, that since the House last met all the sitting members were able to come back and take their places. A number of prominent citizens, however, have passed away. He referred especially to the late Hon. F. J. Nash, Dr. S. R. Jenkins, Mr. Bruce Stewart, Senator Prowse and the late Hon. Mr. Robb, Minister of Finance, "who, had he lived, would doubtless have recognized our claims for subsidy before this."

The speaker also made reference to the heroic career of the late Colonel Barker, V. C., Canadian flying ace in the Great War, and also to the passing of the Chief Justice Taft and the stand the latter had taken on the matter of Reciprocity with Canada.

There was one matter Mr. Allan wanted to clear up if possible; that was the report of what he was supposed to have said at a Temperance Alliance meeting. In the first place, he was late in arriving at the meeting and it was only on the following day that he learned that the meeting was not supposed to have been reported by the press. So he could not fairly be accused of saying at that meeting something that he thought would not be reported. Personally, he believed that meetings of this kind should be fully reported in the public interests. He was surprised, when he looked up the Patriot next day, to see no mention of his remarks.

Mr. Allan said he had been reported as having "maintained that two stills were in the Summerside jail" when the Conservatives were in charge. What he did state at the Alliance meeting was that the present jailer informed him that he had found two stills in the jail when it was taken over.

Mr. Allan then read two documents which he referred to as "affidavits": one from Antoine Arsenault, Summerside, Prince County jailer, the other one from one Louis Gallant, Summerside. The former made solemn declaration that he is the present jailer of Prince County Jail, having succeeded the former jailer, John Steel; that upon taking up said duties he was informed that beer had been made in the prisoners' quarters of said jail during the former regime, that in pursuance of such information he immediately made an investigation which would be not more than a day or so of his assuming office, and found in said prisoners' quarters two containers or cans which contained a quantity of beer and mash; that both containers showed every indication of having been in recent use as the beer had been only recently made and only a part had been consumed. In the latter document Gallant solemnly declared that he was a prisoner in Prince County Jail on several occasions while the former jailer, John Steel, was in charge; that on a number of occasions during said term a number of prisoners in said jail were drinking beer to the point of intoxication; that said beer was made or manufactured by the prisoners in the prisoners' quarters of said jail; that on one particular occasion some of the prisoners became very boisterous or noisy and when Jailer Steele came and tried to restore order one of the prisoners by the name of Campbell threw a coal hod at him; that both whiskey and rum were smuggled into the jail during such periods and distributed among the prisoners; that on one occasion during said period he (Gallant) saw Jailer Steele empty about three gallons of beer in the ashpie, which was made by one of the prisoners in the prisoners' quarters."

Hon. Mr. Stewart asked that both documents be tabled in the House. He pointed out that they were not "affidavits," but "declarations."

Mr. Allan admitted that Ex-Jailer Steele was "a citizen of fairly good repute." He supposed he was "an average citizen," and he was not blaming Mr. Steele for the charge made by the present jailer. He, Mr. Allan, would give Mr. Steele credit for "not knowing" there was any still in the jail during his time; "and consequently, not knowing it was there" but the fact remained "that two containers were found in the jail shortly after the new jailer took charge."

Mr. Allan gave a detailed descrip-

We may give him assistance; it is impossible to say.

Continuing his argument in favor of Prohibition, Mr. Allan said he wished to refute the statement that if we had Government Control all our troubles would be dissipated like night shadows before the morning sun.

Hon. Mr. Stewart: Who ever said that?

Mr. Allan did not reply. He cited instead records of drunkenness in Montreal, showing the difficulties they were encountering in that city under Government Control.

Dr. McMillan: How would that compare with Chicago?

Mr. Allan: I haven't the figures for Chicago.

Mr. Allan figured out, on a basis of expenditure for liquor in Ontario, that Prince Edward Island under Government Control would spend \$270 per capita each year.

Mr. Arsenault: You are leaving the tourists out of your figures for Ontario?

Mr. Allan admitted that he had not counted the tourists. He agreed that in this Province we need more temperance reform, but the way to bring it about, was through Prohibition. "I believe," he said, "that if this Province was strictly temperate in all things we would have a Garden of Eden." Ontario, he maintained, had been unable to get rid of its bootleggers. At the Royal York hotel, on a Sunday evening when the Government stores were not open, they consumed in one room six bottles of bootleg whiskey. Where did these bottles come from?

Dr. McMillan: How many drank out of them?

Mr. Allan: Well, it was in one room; a bedroom.

Mr. Arsenault: They were not from Prince Edward Island, were they?

Mr. Allan: Shall I tell you who was there? It might embarrass you.

Dr. McMillan: Was that the time the members of this House were attending a celebration in Toronto? (Laughter).

Mr. Allan quoted Sir Henry Drayton, chairman of the Liquor Control Board of Ontario, as saying that there was too much drinking among young people.

In proof of the progress of prohibition enforcement in this Province, he said that in 1928 there were 629 searches, 108 informations laid, 72 convictions, 31 dismissals, and \$6,590 collected in fines; whereas in 1929 there were 1200 searches, 337 informations laid, 277 convictions, 55 dismissals, and \$17,990 collected in fines. That showed, Mr. Allan contended, that the present administration is doing something to enforce the law. "That is why we have them in the jails today; we are locking them up, and when we have them

locked up they can't bootleg on the streets. Mr. Allan referred to a horse race in Summerside three years ago. It was "generally reported" that the prohibition officers "were supposed to leave the town during the horse race." Mr. Allan went to the race, and he would say that twenty-five per cent of the people present had been drinking. This year they had "horse races galore," and at the last race, where there was an attendance of fifty per cent more than they had three years ago, he did not see one person under the influence of liquor. "The people know that we make an occasional blunder, but the duty and the wish and the desire of this Government is to do its utmost to enforce the law."

One of the previous speakers charged that there had been interference with prosecutions. He, Mr. Allan, could state that he never on any occasion did anything to stop a prohibition officer from enforcing the law; in fact, he did all he could to enforce the law when he considered the information was of any benefit.

Mr. Allan made critical reference to the remarks of the last speaker (Dr. McMillan) on prohibition enforcement. In future it would not be necessary to send to Montreal for a detective. He (Dr. McMillan) professes to have knowledge of certain things, and it is his duty as a citizen to hand that knowledge over to the Attorney General.

In conclusion, Mr. Allan said it was "better to continue with Prohibition, even if the results were not 100 per cent satisfactory. "It is better to do right imperfectly than do wrong successfully. Eventually, not now, the majority of our citizens will realize that when they put their trust in the keeping of the Liberal party of this Province, that trust was not misplaced." (Applause from Liberal members).


