A MONTREAL despatch of the 19th says.—The ice bridge at Cape Rouge gave way this morning and the river is now open to navigation. The first steamer from sea Jacoma (Br.) from the Mediterranean with fruit, is expected to arrive at Quebec tomorrow morning, and Montreal Monday afternoon.

A HALIFAX despatch of April 20th says: The steamer Wassaw brought the last batch of Canadians from England last evening. They included Sergt. A. Dingwell, an Islander who enlisted in the Strathcona's at Virdeau; also private Smith of the first contingent, native of Arichat, who lost both legs in the railway accident near Johannesburg.

MR. W. S. McKie, the well-known Charlottetown horseman, arrived yesterday afternoon from Montreal, where he has purchased another carload of fine horses, which he intends to sell to persons in this city. Mr. McKie says his horses will arrive here to-day and will be taken to Love's stable, where they will be placed on exhibition for the benefit of intending purchasers. There are 18 horses in the lot and they are composed chiefly of fine family driving horses. Among the lot is a beautiful matched team of blacks; also a very fast trotting horse and these, with the others, will prove very interesting to lovers of horses. The animals will be on exhibition shortly after their arrival to-day.—St. John Telegraph.

THE window of Messrs. F. Perkins & Co's store on Saturday evening was so gracefully arranged that during the greater part of the evening crowds pressed around to have a look at its arrangement. Three wax figures beautifully dressed were in the centre, two of them representing ladies, one dressed in out door attire of black skirt with a shirt waist of white embroidery over blue, wearing a hat of light chiffon, while the second was dressed in cream material looped with lace and flowers, set off by a picture hat of black chiffon and feathers. The third figure was a little girl, dressed in white embroidery wearing a white hat, which was "sweet pretty." The remainder of the window was gracefully draped in white, relieved with purple and gold, while in the rear was a large mirror over which were arranged the very latest things in summer sunshades. THE following taken from the St. John's Telegram, Nfld., will be of interest of P. E. Island:—"We are told that, in all probability, a petition from the butchers of St. John's will be presented to the House of Assembly during the coming session, praying that horned cattle, sheep and pigs be added to the list of free imports. They contend, it seems, that there is not enough cattle raised in the colony to supply the demand for fresh meat, and that, under existing circumstances, it is impossible to give the public beef and mutton at reasonable prices, and, at the same time, enable the suppliers to realize a fair margin of profit. At present cattle and sheep can be obtained only at fancy prices. The matter is an important one and deserves every consideration at the hands of the Legislature. Of course, before taking any definite action, it will be necessary to ascertain the views of farmers and other interested parties. We have not yet heard from the Secretary of the Agricultural Society on the subject.

The well-known evangelists, Hunter and Crossley, have just closed a series of revival services in this City, extending over five weeks. Although there was not, in the fullest sense, a union of the different denominations, but only of the Methodist churches of the City, yet night after night the Park Street Church, in which most of the services were held was crowded to the door. Mr. Hunter, as a conductor of a meeting, is unsurpassed, and his Bible readings are full of path and power. Mr. Crossley has lost none of his old-time power as a singer of the Gospel, and has grown in power as a keen expositor, an able reasoner and a persuasive preacher. As a result of these meetings nearly two hundred new members were added to the Methodist churches of the City, and a large number of names were handed to the other pastors of the City.—Chatham Exchange.
