## LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

OBITUARY.—The death of Henry A., the youngest surviving son of Archibald and Melinda Campbell, has cast a gloom of sadness over the community of Milburn. The bereavement is rendered still more sorrowful when it is remembered that but a short time ago they were called upon to witness the solemn and impressive Providence of death in the mortality of a son fallen asleep in the slumbers of the grave. The deceased, fair and tender as a plant too tender to bloom in this earthly soil, was suddenly removed from his earthly abode to that heavenly paradise beyond the skies where parting is unknown. While yet in the bud, love transplanted him to a more genial clime there to unfold and blossom for ever. His disposition was remarkably affectionate and his filial and brotherly feelings were the most lively and refined that can well be imagined. Although in the puerile stage of life, he was taught to trust in the precious faith which, sustained by its elevating influence, caused the sufferer to descend with a composed step into the valley of the shadow of death and pass on through its darkness to a better land. To his sorrowful father, sister and brothers we extend our sincerest sympathy in this their hour of mourning.

EASTERN NOTES.—The electric condition of the atmosphere that caused so much loss and destruction here last week has passed away, and now we have fine hay making weather of which the farmers are taking advantage. As expected the crop is going to be a short one. Other crops look well, and with favorable weather for a few more weeks, a good yield is assured.—Fishing has been poor for the last week, neither hake nor mackerel caught, many of the fishermen leaving the fish for a week, to put up their hay. With the exception of a few small vessels cod fishermen from Nova Scotia there is not a fishing vessel round East Point this season; something that has not been known for at least 60 years, or more. The American mackerel fleet has dwindled down to small dimensions owing to no mackerel to catch, and the remnant is getting fair catches in their own waters.—The Nova Scotia mackerel fleet is no more, and her men have turned their attention to deep sea fishing and banking which they find more remunerative and certain, while this Island's fleet may be said to be a thing of the past. For many years she made heroic efforts to get a fleet of her own, her sons possessed the daring and skill, and formed a respectable portion of the captains and crews of the New England fleet, but the last few years the want of fish, they having been destroyed by the purse seine, shattered the last hope of ever owning a fleet of mackerel catchers in these waters.—Our roads are nearly deserted at present, the busy season is here, and the farmers are attending to their business, leaving the travelling with the tourist, the agent, the milk hauler and the pedlar. Conspicuous among the latter two classes is the familiar form of William Young, proof against all kinds of weather, and who yet bears but few marks of the snows of many winters and storms that he has encountered, and the not less conspicuous form of Theodore Stewart who drives his pedlar's wagon, and gives good bargains to his many customers in the different settlements he visits.
