A peculiar feature is that most of the Chinese laundries are able to keep going. The net result is that some laundries closed altogether while others must send their goods to laundries outside the zone of trouble. In the meantime Montreal is suffering serious inconvenience.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Madam Lillian Nordica sends a wireless today to the Associated Press telling of the vessel encountered in the Gulf of Papua by the steamer Tasman on which she is a passenger.

"All aboard the Tasman speak highly of the splendid behavior of the Captain and officers, and also of the wireless operator. The vessel struck Saturday night and uncertainty prevailed as to the possibility of floating her. She went ashore on Bramble Bay Reef from which she was towed yesterday by a Japanese collier. The exact amount of damage sustained has not been ascertained but the pumps are keeping the water well under. The Tasman is proceeding to Thursday Island under her own steam for repairs after which she will continue her voyage."

PRESIDIO, Dec. 31.—It is the opinion of military experts here today the battle of Ojinaga would be decided within twenty-four hours. Likewise it is believed the only chance for the Federals to escape extermination, should the rebels pour

in on them, is flight across the American border. The Federals are reported short of ammunition while the rebels appear to have plenty. The rebels are closing in on the Federals. The rebels intend to shoot all Federal volunteers whether they surrender or not.

United States troops along the border are considering what they will do if four thousand men commanded by a dozen generals pour across the border. Major McNamee, commanding the patrol, has less than a thousand men stationed at points where the Federals are likely to cross.

Knight Bachelors, Hon. Horace Archambault, Chief Justice of the Court of King's Bench, Quebec; Henry Kelly Egan, Esq., Ottawa.

In addition to the Canadian list ex-Ambassador James Bryce is made Viscount; Sir Rufus Isaacs, the new British Lord Chief Justice, Alexander Ure, Lord President of the Scottish Court of Sessions; Sir Charles Cripp, Unionist member of Parliament from Buckinghamshire, and Sir Arnold Harnsworth, brother of Lord Northcliffe, are raised to the peerage.

Courtney Walter Bennet, British Consul General at New York, is also created a Knight. Sir Gerald Augustus Lowther, recently Ambassador at Constantinople, is created a Baronet; Owen Seaman, editor of Punch since 1906, is knighted.
