Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must sign in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, and may be made an agent in certain cases. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$12.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in tax—rough, scrubby or stony and live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

INTERESTING STORY OF GERMAN SAVAGERY

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Thomas Kenny, Morell, from her son, Gr. Martin Kenny, 2nd Siege Battery, France. He had been on the firing line exactly one year when peace was signed.

France, Oct. 25th, 1918. DEAR MOTHER,—Received your letters of Aug. and Sept. 30th and as usual was glad to hear from home. I suppose you must have hard work getting in the harvest help must be so scarce. Don't work too hard mother and do take care of yourself.

I suppose your have read about the great advances we have made and are still making. We surely are driving him back fast. For several days we were out of touch with him, he was going so fast. We have captured innumerable villages. Some of them are badly damaged by shell-fire, that is the ones we first captured. The later ones are scarcely touched. He left them so quickly he did not have time to remove the furniture or take but few civilians.

The civilians in the liberated towns are so glad to be once more in France. No wonder, for the past four years they have been treated worse than the slaves of early ages. One woman told me the only food they were ever sure of was what they had just eaten, because once they eat it the Huns could not get it. The Hun soldiers did just what they pleased.

One case only will I relate of a German private billeted in a French house, the father of the family was made to work in Germany so a German could go to the front. The mother was left with three small children. Well this dirty brute of a soldier made the poor woman wash his feet, empty his dirty slops, etc. After all this he would call her a "swine" and beat her at the smallest provocation, and to think that if the Germans had won this would have been the fate of many Canadian women and perhaps my own friends. Thank God I have been able to help a little to keep such a fate from you dear mother, even if it cost my life you see why I give it gladly.

These poor people are so glad to see us the first thing they do when you enter the house is to give you a cup of coffee. No matter how often you go in or out of the house it is the same, and you must drink it for they consider it an insult if you refuse. We spent a day and a night in one of those towns and I drank enough coffee to float a ship. It is very strong coffee too. Well at last I got so full and knowing I could not refuse I stayed outside altogether. The poor things have so little to give and wish to show their thanks so much that I was

really sorry for them. They would not allow us to sleep in the barn or even on the floor in the house. The best bed they had was not good enough for the Canadian soldiers.

At present we are billeted in a town where some of the civilians left in a hurry, German sympathizers no doubt. Well, we are in one of their houses, the furniture is simply grand; lamps, clocks, stoves, tables, easy chairs, everything even to a piano. Oh believe me we are "well away."

The fields are full of the best of vegetables and we take advantage of them. We are living like kings. We have been here for three or four days, I suppose we shall soon move again in a day or so and then good-bye feeds.

I am now first on the leave list probably may go to-morrow or next day. I am going to Paris, Niece and Monte Carlo, I shall write you from there that is if I have time.

I haven't heard from George for sometime, I tried to see his battalion but could not. I do hope he is O. K.

We have lost considerable Island boys during the last couple of months, poor chaps, they died bravely, fighting for a good cause, and their folks should rejoice that they were "men" enough to do so.

Well mother I must close for this time. Give my best love to father, Lem and wife. I am as ever,
