MARITIME TELEPHONE.—It is reported that the Maritime Telephone and Telephone Company has transferred its shares in the capital stock of the Telephone company of Prince Edward Island to the Eastern Trust Company in trust for the Maritime bond and shareholders.

EARLY CLOSING.—In order to let the students do war work with a view of greater production it has been decided to close Mount Allison University this year on Friday, May 10. Senior examinations will have ended by that time and convocation will be held Thursday evening, May 9. The first idea was to do away with convocation entirely but some opposition to that course developed with the result that the original plan was modified.

A P. E. I. SCHOONER.—Having discharged her cargo of molasses at Pictou and Black's wharf, the schooner Albarata moved up Sunday to Silver's wharf where she will load for the West Indies, says the Halifax Herald. The schooner Talmouth shifted from Silver's, where she has been laid up all winter, to Central wharf to finish discharging her cargo of potatoes which has been in her hold since she arrived here from Prince Edward Island.

SHIPPING NOTES.—The Halifax Herald says that three of last season's regular freighters showed up Sunday when the schooners Noble H. from Isaac's Harbor, Lorne, from Bramport, and Alice and Nellie from Peteswick arrived from those shores where they were in winter quarters. The Noble H. is to take back a load of salt. The barge Languish, in tow of the Cruiser, from Louisbourg, also arrived. Among the vessels taking out clearance papers was the schooner Gladys E. Whidden, her owner, Captain James McKinnon, having come from Sydney to arrange for the towing of the vessel to Liverpool where she will load lumber for a United States port after some repairs are made to the vessel at the south shore port. She has been laid up all winter at Black and Flynn's wharf where she landed last fall with a load of Prince Edward Island potatoes, the largest cargo of potatoes brought from the Island during the season. Several coastwise craft sailed yesterday, the Edith F. S., for Yarmouth; Hury Up and Maggie B. for Chester; Marguerite for Whitehead, and T. W. Smith for Jeddore; also the Norma P. Cooley for the banks. The steamer Louisburg, Captain Kemp, for Louisburg, was discharging her cargo of coal for the Dominion Coal company.
