Premier Pleased With New Export Prices

Premier J. Walter Jones in a statement to The Guardian last night respecting the release by Ottawa of the new prices for Canadian bacon, eggs, and cheese on the British market, said the new prices exceeded his own anticipations.

"Pork and cheese have received practically a 20 per cent boost which offsets the increased price of feeds and gives the farmers the 'go ahead' signal. It is a matter of regret that a few faint-hearted farmers saw fit to kill off their young pigs last fall.

The opening up of trade with the United States under the terms of the recent Geneva Agreement is another factor which, taken in conjunction with the new prices for Canadian meat, cheese, and eggs on the British market, should mean a prosperous 1948 for Island farmers.
