Island Pastor Who Labored in Eight Provinces of Canada

(Vancouver Sun.)

There is one man in the province of British Columbia who, though well past the allotted three score years and ten, feels as young in spirit and body as he did when he was 20 years of age and who still does much the same day's work as he did in his youth. This man is Rev. D. G. McDonald, pastor of two churches, one at Ladner and the other the Broadway West Baptist church in this city. If there is another man in the province who can present a similar record he remains to be found.

Rev. Mr. McDonald is not a tall man in stature, yet he stands upright and his eyes twinkle with the irresistible spirit of youth, and even a taller man does not feel as if he were looking upon a smaller man but upon one of equal height. His cheeks retain a cheerful rosy color and though his beard is grayed he is a man on an equal footing with those of all ages, for he is possessed of that wonderful spirit of youth which knows no age.

"How old are you?" asked The Sun reporter, feeling that a man of his years would be proud of his age.

Mr. McDonald's eyes twinkled. "I was 66 years old ten years ago," he said.

The 66 years sticks in one's memory, for he is far more active than many a man of even 70, and 66 is more fitting his appearance than the ten added years.

"But I don't feel it," he added. "I am able to do as much work in a week now as at any period of my life without more weariness," he said.

Fifty Years a Preacher.

Last Sunday Mr. McDonald preached three times, and one may guess from talking with him that he put as much zeal and fire into each of those three sermons as he did twenty, thirty, or even fifty years ago, for he has been preaching for fifty years.

For the past ten years Mr. McDonald has been an active worker in this province. He is now in his sixth year at Ladner, and has had, in addition to that work, charge of the Broadway west Baptist church for the past three years.

During his long career in the ministry, Mr. McDonald has carried on his work from the Atlantic to the Pacific, in eight of the provinces of the dominion.

"And which province do you prefer," he was asked.

"British Columbia," was his quick answer. "British Columbia with superb climate, its unrivalled possibilities for men of energy, its multitudinous and pressing needs for men with vital message. It appeals to me most. If German theology, Russian Bolshevism and other heresies so much in evidence were swept into the Pacific, this would be the peer of all the provinces."

Born in P. E. I.

Mr. McDonald was born in Prince Edward Island, in February, 1843, and became a convert to the Baptist faith

in 1863, deciding to become a clergyman in 1869. In the latter year he commenced to preach. He was ordained minister of the First Baptist church in Newport, N. S., during his university course at Acadia in 1873.

On leaving Acadia he returned to Prince Edward Island and for eight years resided in Charlottetown. In 1881 he set forth for the theological seminary in Newton, Mass., but he did not get there until four years later, laboring in the meantime in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Finally he took up the theological course and after a term in Newton, went to McMaster university, Toronto, where he took the degree of B. Th. Eleven of Mr. McDonald's years in the ministry have been spent in evangelical work.

The reporter expressed curiosity as to how many new members he had brought into the church during those years.

"I don't know," was the reply. "The Lord keeps the books."

He kept no record, he added, so he would have no temptation towards discouragement or undue pride. But many there were who had been baptised. In one series of meetings, he recalled, he baptised three persons averaging each 90 years of age. The eldest was a woman of 97.

The question of his own age was referred to.

"You seem to be a young man yet," the interviewer said.

The Soul Never Ages.

"It is because the soul never grows old," he said. "By the grace of God my soul is on top. My work is a delight and it keeps my own soul in touch with others, renewing my youth."

Mr. McDonald came west in 1897, beginning his work at Portage la Prairie. Then he went to Manitoba and later to Saskatchewan. During the thirteen years in the two latter provinces he built thirteen churches. Since coming to this province he has built four churches. In his present work, Mr. McDonald conducts seven services each week and sometimes more. He spends the first half of the week in Ladner and the latter half in the city.

"How do you manage to cover so much ground?" he was asked.

"I brought a pair of ponies from Prince Edward Island with me," he answered.

The reporter was somewhat surprised as horses are out of date.

"You should exchange them for a motor car," he suggested.

Then Mr. McDonald stuck out his feet.

"These are my ponies," he laughed.

HARNESS HORSES BRING BIG PRICES

Unusually high prices were realized at the second and final day of the Fas-tipton Company's annual blue ribbon sale of harness horses in Madison Square Garden. The several offerings brought from twenty-five to thirty per cent more than those that went under the hammer on the opening day. Top price was paid for Sunflash, a two year old bay colt by Peter Volo-Lizzie Leyburn. He was bought by W.H. Kane, a New York builder, for \$3,500. Sunflash is one of the first of the get of Peter Volo 2:02. Last autumn at Lexington Sunflash trotted a quarter of a mile at a 2:10 gait. He is regarded as a great racing prospect.

Twenty-seven yearlings sold yesterday brought \$9,060, or an average of \$335.55. Wednesday thirty-two head of horses of the same age fetched \$12,380. The total for the two days was \$21,440, an average of \$363.50.

PRODUCTION OF SPIRITS FELL OFF

OTTAWA, March 26—A heavy falling off in the production of spirits in Canada during the fiscal year which ended with March 31, 1918, as compared with the previous year is shown by the annual report of the Inland Revenue branch tabled in the House of Commons today. Production of spirits during the fiscal year which closed on March 31, 1917 totalled 6,400,117 gallons. For the fiscal year which will close at the end of the present month there will doubtless be a still greater falling off owing to the Dominion prohibition regulations now in force.

The foreign demand for the products of Canadian distilleries was also less for the fiscal year dealt with, being only 587,409 proof gallons as compared with 1,289,177 gallons during the previous year and 808,000 for the year ending with March 1917.

The amount of raw materials consumed in the manufacture of spirits during the year was as follows: malt, 5,372,991 gallons; Indian corn, 35,633,568 bushels; oats, 124,460 bushels; and molasses, 18,171,440 gallons.
