CANADA'S TEAM INCREASED TO TWENTY-FOUR

HAMILTON, Ont., July 20.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Canadian Olympic track and field squad was increased to 24 men tonight when the Olympic committee decided to include Les Wade, star Montreal 1,500 metre runner; Len Hutton, Montreal broad jumper and Harold Gallop, Hamilton middle distance runner, on the team.

Expenses of Wade, Hutton and Gallop, who failed to reach Olympic standards at the trials here last week, have been raised by popular subscription in Montreal and Hamilton.

Hutton, British Empire broad jump champion, failed to do better than 23 feet, 2 1/4 inches at the trials and was defeated by Ollie Holland, Hamilton colored boy. Holland was not selected for the team. Gallop finished second to St. Clair Davidson of Listowel, Ont., in the 3,000 metre steeplechase. Davidson also was not chosen by the Olympic committee.

Canadian champion at a mile last year, Wade lost by a scant two-foot margin to Phil Edwards in the 1,500 metres at the trials. He made a great finish to battle Edwards right to the tape but the time was considered too slow to warrant placing the Montrealer on the squad at the committee's expense.

AIR PAGEANT HERE AUG. 31

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., July 20.—Plans for a Maritime Province air pageant were completed today at a meeting attended by representatives of New Glasgow, Halifax, Charlottetown and Cape Breton Flying Clubs.

The pageant will open at Sydney Wednesday, August 17, under the auspices of the Cape Breton Flying Club.

One week later the show will be at Halifax, Charlottetown will be visited on August 31, and the closing performance will be coupled with the official opening of the Pitcairn county airport at New Glasgow.

Fred Mosher, of Glace Bay, presided at the meeting today.

The following general advisory committee was appointed for the pageant, which will be staged with about twelve planes:

Dr. J. S. Jenkins, Charlottetown, Chairman; F. J. Mosher, Glace Bay; L. D. Fayzant, New Glasgow; R. J. R. Nelson, Halifax; Fred Mitchell, Sydney.

Others who attended the meeting today included Don McPherson, pilot instructor, and Norman Denison, air engineer, of the Cape Breton Flying Club, and Junior Jones, of Charlottetown.

Another Track Record Broken

Billy Cope With Pat McKenna Up Shatters Mark Of Major Aubrey At St. Peters Yesterday.

Everything was set for a splendid afternoon's racing at St. Peters Bay yesterday but the elements got unruly about four o'clock and a terrific downpour of rain sent people scurrying to their cars to secure covering of some sort to protect themselves from the torrential shower. The track was literally a sea of mud for a few minutes, then the storm subsided and cars were brought into requisition and in a short time it was whipped into pretty good shape, enabling the management to complete three of the races although under difficult conditions as rain again fell. The fourth event for Kings County horses could not be raced.

That the horses had plenty of step is shown by the fact that the track record of 2:14 1/2 made by Major Aubrey in 1928 was broken in two of the three events, first by King Spruce with Orin Jardine driving and then by Billy Cope with Pat McKenna up.

The attendance was fully up to previous years and was roughly in the vicinity of 3,000.

The first race called was the 2:22 Trot and Pace. There was considerable scoring, Dillingwood Earl deciding that it was not race day for him had to be drawn. Then they got away quickly. King Spruce in the lead with Hush who had drawn fifth place making a gallant try to overtake him but he could not do it, King Spruce winning by over a length in 2:14 a new track record, with Jessica the Great going a good race finishing third, Dixie Marque and Watts Edition fighting it out for fourth and fifth place. The second and third heats were won by King Spruce in handy fashion, the others having the same summary.

2:15 Trot and Pace. There was the usual uncertainty over this event due to the meeting of the old rivals Lucky Lindy and Billy Cope. They got away with very little scoring, Billy Cope at the pole, Lindy in sixth place trailing. Billy made every post a winning one finishing half a length to the good hanging up a new track record displacing that made by King Spruce a few minutes previously, in 2:13 1/2. Second Heat. When they entered the back stretch Lindy sprinted past Billy and held the lead to the finish, although Cope's driver made every effort to win in the stretch. This was a most exciting heat. Max Winnie beat out Maxine Great for third position. When the third heat was called the track was in terrible condition due to the rain. Owner James Power substituted for Pat McKenna as driver of Billy Cope. Lindy held the lead for a good part of the mile then made a wobble and Cope went up winning nicely in good time coeidering the track, 2:22. 2:28 Trot and Pace. The first heat

Disarmament Conference

GENEVA, July 20.—(A.P.)—The world disarmament conference's general commission today received an adjournment resolution providing for limitation of specified heavy land guns and undefined effective troops.

The draft resolution, as explained by the leading drafter, Dr. Edward Benes, of Czechoslovakia, is a five-point proposal covering the terms of the conference to date, what shall be done in the future, and the points upon which agreement already has been virtually reached.

MONTREAL, July 20.—Outright sale of Babe Siebert, big left winger, to the New York Rangers was announced by President James F. Strachan, of the Montreal Maroons Club of the National Hockey League, tonight.

Sale price was "a big bundle of cash—too good an offer to turn down," Strachan said. A proposed straight trade of Siebert for Earl Siebert of the Rangers fell through. Rangers offered Maroons Oss Hendler, left winger with Springfield, the New York farm, for \$7,000 but it was refused.

Siebert is the second of "Big-S" line to be sold, Nelson Stewart having been purchased by Boston Bruins. Only Hooley Smith remains of that powerful combination.
