Rev. G. F. Dawson, York and Rev. L. J. Wason, Moncton, will exchange pulpits on the 28th, on which occasion Mr. Dawson will preach sermons in aid of the Home Missionary Fund.

Charlottetown Local, No. 119 I. O. G. T. is booked to be one of the best Lodges in the Province. A very interesting meeting was held last night in Castle Hall. Considerable enthusiasm was manifested and an excellent program of speeches, readings, etc., was rendered.

Timothy Lee, a Lynn policeman was the first witness after the afternoon recess in the Melkie trial at St. John's, Tuesday. His testimony related to the conditions at the Melkie house after the shooting.

J. McCarthy the next neighbor was the most important witness of the day, testifying that about 12.15 p.m., on the day of the shooting young Melkie came running out shouting "Jerry! Jerry! father has shot himself". Then the boy went into McCarthy's house and McCarthy went into Melkie's house, finding the elder Melkie lying on the floor. The witness telephoned for the police, staying till they arrived. He identified a slate in the Court as the one he saw in the room and on it were the words: "Before you go to school, and get the card and note from the teacher. You stay in the house or I will have you arrested."

The witness heard young Melkie tell a crowd of boys on the street that "The old man shot himself". Melkie told him his father never holds a word before he shot himself. The boy was not crying at anytime and only seemed a little excited. On cross examination the witness denied he ever expressed pity in his own language of opinion. He admitted he had to mediate about this case. He said he had been asked by the boy never miss a going to Sunday School. The witness did not hear any shot at the time of the shooting. The Court then adjourned until this morning.

The cause of numerous diseases and disagreeable habits, heretofore ascribed as constitutional, have been traced directly to the teeth. Blindness, drizzling, frothing, loss of flesh, weak eyes, driving on one rein and pulling are very often due to diseased and irregular teeth. Rough edges and sharp corners of the teeth lacerate the mouth, and produce nervousness and irritability; uneven and elongated molars and incisors prevent the proper mastication of the food, producing indigestion and general debility. Decayed molars cause necrosis of the bone, abscesses, nasal gliet, etc. These causes should be removed. Decayed teeth should be removed by extracting or trepanning, sharp corners and rough edges should be smoothed down, and elongated and uneven molars and incisors cut off. The common float, or file heretofore deemed sufficient to accomplish this, will not suffice but special instruments devised for the purpose are necessary. 4-25drhru
