A WONDERFUL INCUBATOR.—The largest incubator ever brought to Prince Edward Island is now installed in the Agricultural Hall. It is a Buckeye Mammoth measuring 10x14 feet and 7 ft. 3 in high and has a capacity for 10,500 eggs. It is equipped with a great number of shelves upon which are placed trays to hold the eggs which are placed therein on end. The shelves are reversible and are shifted to a different angle each day in order to permit the heat to be evenly distributed through the eggs. The trays containing the eggs are also alternated daily to facilitate the incubation process. An oil stove heating arrangement provides the heat for the apparatus and a series of fans is also part of the equipment. This incubator was purchased conjointly by the local Department of Agriculture and Canadian Farm Products Ltd. There are also three smaller incubators of the same make in the Agricultural Hall, each with capacity of 2400 eggs. All are under the capable charge of Mr. A. F. Houston, the well known poultryman.

MT. STEWART SOCIAL CLUB.—The Social Club met in the Foresters Hall on the 17th inst., with President Daniel in the chair. After ordinary business was through, the President introduced the speaker of the evening, Hon. Frederick Nash, who addressed the club for fifty minutes, taking for his subject, literature and oratory. This could best be done he said, by being a daily reader of current newspapers, and good periodicals. WEATHER EXTREMES.—While this continent, of the eastern part of it, is just emerging from one of the hardest winters in the record, reverse conditions have prevailed across the Atlantic. A recent letter says flowers are blooming and farming operations are proceeding in southern England. The Westminster Gazette says, that the past winter has been one of the most unseasonable that Londoners have experienced for many years. Save for a sharp frost in the first few days of January, temperatures have been consistently high, and during the last month the mercury in the shaded thermometer on three successive days attained the remarkable height, for February, of over 60 degrees. There was a slight excess of rain in January but the record for the whole of February was drier than an inch, and the sunshine recorders have been kept exceptionally busy marking the sunny hours of what is usually the dullest period of the year. There was snow in November, but since then none has fallen in London, and March opened with the conditions favorable for a continuance of unseasonably mild weather.
