Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in any of the Provinces of Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not only a general one but also a specific one. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. The area of cultivation is subject to restriction in a case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. AS OTHERS SEE CANADA'S PROBLEMS

Opinions on Quebec's Lukewarmness to War by United States Journals.

(From the New York Post.)

"The attitude of the French Canadians of Quebec is becoming more and more inexplicable. Their pitiful opposition to conscription sets a climax to a record of indifference. Since the war began Quebec has furnished only a fraction of its quota of volunteers, and lately the meager driblet has come from the province. Recruiting agents have been insulted and menaced near Montreal. Now that many Canadian leaders declare that the Dominion's army in Europe can be kept full and the home industries maintained in tact only by government control over the disposition of able-bodied males, demonstrators have smashed windows, soldiers returned from Europe have been attacked, and in some districts the authorities are reported to be considering the proclamation of martial law. French papers like L'Evenement are not definitely opposed to conscription; other papers, as La Liberté, and political leaders like Bourassa and Lavergne, are fighting it, as they have many times before. They have even been covertly fought the voluntary enlistment of Canadians for overseas service. The ill-feeling displayed has its roots in memories as old as the wars between France and England on this continent, and a more direct origin in the language controversy and the agitation of Bourassa."

(From the New York Tribune.) "Now, when she is about to go on a conscription basis, Canada realizes to what extent reluctance to go to war may manifest even among a relatively homogeneous, unhyphenated people. There are two strains of blood in Canada's population. But it is impossible to call either element hyphenated in the American sense, for the French Canadians have lived on Dominion soil longer than the English-speaking Canadians have. Yet with no conflicting blood or cultural ties (for France and Great Britain are now allies), the French Canadians have shown a surprising disinclination either to enlist or to support the war otherwise. They have practised the pacifism which our own pacifists have so far only talked about. Conscription has been deferred for nearly three years because of the fear that it would bring about a clash between the English-speaking and the French-speaking elements."

"Americans will sympathize with the Canadian government in its dilemma. And looking back at our exhibition of indecision and our lack of unified national feeling, due to the pro-German and the pacifist elements, both alien and native, in our population, English-speaking Canadians will doubtless now modify their former critical attitude toward us. Our predicament was for a long time graver than theirs. But we have extricated ourselves. They will extricate themselves also."

ANNUAL MEETING WOMEN'S INSTITUTE AT MONTAGUE

The annual meeting of the Montague Branch of the Women's Institute was held July 6th in the Red Cross rooms, with a good attendance of both members and visitors. The President gave a splendid report of the year's work, and also congratulated Mrs. Gordon Ives on her appointment as school trustee for the incoming term. The Secretary reported that during the year 100 lbs. of wool had been bought and spun and knit, by the ladies of the Society, kindly assisted by a great many from the village and vicinity. Also that 150 boxes and parcels with over 200 pairs of socks had been sent to the boys in England and France, besides boxes sent to the Island prisoners.

The sum of \$768.14 was raised for Red Cross purposes, \$300.00 of which was voted for war funds, and the Society are also supporting two prisoners in Germany. After the usual business, the officers for the ensuing year were appointed. Before closing the Institute unanimously passed the pledge for "Thrift."

SWEDEN IS FEEDING GERMANY'S PLANTS

WASHINGTON.—An official report just made to the American Government showing the extent to which Sweden is furnishing supplies to Germany reveals that the Central Powers are receiving enormous quantities of materials that go directly into the manufacture of munitions. In exporting iron ore to Germany Sweden, it is shown has supplemented its shipments with imports from the United States. What this Government will do to end this trade through operation of the Export Control Act, has not been announced; but some of the Allies, it is known, are urging the United States to license no food exports to Sweden until a definite understanding has been reached with the Swedish Government concerning her exports to Germany. Iron ore shipments from Sweden to Germany, the report made to this Government declares, have reached a total of 9,000,000 tons in the last two years, an amount equal to Sweden's entire pre-war export.
