SOURIS EAST AND MONTAGUE

"It pays to buy in this Province."

"The Swansea Trader arrived in Montague at 10.30 this morning to load produce."

"While directing some repairs on the ferry wharf, Georgetown, Wednesday morning, Pius Flanagan met with quite a serious accident. The pilot driver got out of commission, and the hammer, while descending and struck Mr. Flanagan on the head. He was rendered unconscious for a time, but he has since revived, and latest reports are that he is doing as well as can be expected."

"Wednesday was nomination day for the first Civic Election to be held in Georgetown, which is to be elevated on the rank of an incorporated town on New Year's Day. According to the incorporation of the town is to be ruled by a Mayor and six Councilors. Yesterday it was decided to have no contest for the first election and the following ticket was therefore returned by acclamation. Mayor—G. Albert Aitken. Councilors—W. W. Jenkins, Charles Fitzgerald, R. R. Jenkins, John McCormack, Temple W. McDonald and Seymour Knight. His Worship Mayor Aitken has been Chairman of the Board of Assessors for about thirty years and his elevation to the mayoralty, is in recognition of his long service."

RUNNING RIGHTS FOR C. P. R. OVER I. C. R.

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.—That the Canadian Pacific Railway is likely to get running rights over the Intercolonial with express privileges for its subsidiary company, the Dominion Express, is apparent from an answer given in the Commons this afternoon by Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways.

Hon. H. R. Emmeron asked as to the correctness of the newspaper reports that, beginning with July 1 next, the C. P. R. would be given running rights over the Intercolonial and the Dominion Express Company would be given the privileges of the Government line.

Mr. Cochrane replied that no arrangement had been made "as yet" but the Dominion Express Company were to be given the same rights as the Intercolonial Express Company controlled by the Grand Trunk.

Mr. Emmeron wanted to know if the C. P. R. would be compelled to grant to other express companies on its Maritime lines equal rights with the Dominion Express.

Mr. Cochrane replied that his first answer covered the ground.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Nov. 27.—The Minister of customs announced that a tariff will be introduced at the next session of parliament, taxing foreign goods in favor of those of British origin.

The king will visit the Duke of Devonshire at Elnmore Castle, Waterford, and Dublin, and other parts of the coast will be visited by him in the royal yacht.

N. Y. GAMBLING DEN'S ARE GOING OUT OF BUSINESS

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Gambling houses in New York are closing for lack of patrons, and there are no patrons practically because the police are spying on those who frequent the resorts and serving them with John Doe subpoenas to appear in court and testify. This was the news at police headquarters to-day, where it was said that Police Commissioner Waldo in a new crusade against gambling had adopted a plan of instilling the fear of exposure into the hearts of patrons as a substitute for raids, which are often fruitless.

Detectives are put on the trail of a person leaving a gambling house, who follow him to his home. There he is served with a subpoena to appear in court and testify against the gambling house. Usually, it is said, he begs off, pleading with the detectives that to have his wife or employer learn of his nocturnal activities would spell trouble and disgrace. On promises never to return to the resort again many have been let off, it is said, and not only have they kept their promises, but spread the news of their narrow escape to other patrons. As a result some of the most widely known gambling houses against which the police have been unable to get evidence have, it is declared, closed their doors.

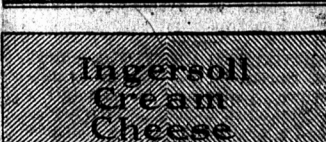

SOME RELIABLE RECEIPTS

Sweetbreads in Tomato.—Procure one pound of calves' sweetbreads; remove the tough parts and put them into cold water to soak over night. Wash in the morning and put them under the fire in cold water. As soon as the water boils pour it off and pour more and let simmer for half an hour. Ten minutes before removing from the fire add to the water a tablespoonful of salt; drain and cool by plunging into cold water, then strain again. This process of parboiling makes or mbrs the delicious flavor of the sweetbreads. The thin membrane which covers each section must be removed. Should these pieces show a reddish tint they have not been sufficiently cooled and should be boiled a few minutes longer. Slice and try to a golden brown in two tablespoonsful of butter or drippings. Pare five medium sized tomatoes and cut in small pieces. When the sweetbreads are brown remove and cook them in the butter in which they were fried. Stir often and let them cook to pieces. Season to taste. When they have cooked to a smooth consistency stir in a teaspoonful of butter rolled in flour. Drop the sweetbreads in the tomatoes boil up at once and serve.

Southern Corn Bread.—One and one-half cupsful of white corn meal, half a cupful of flour, two teaspoonfuls of sugar, half a teaspoonful of baking powder, two teaspoonfuls of lard, one and one-half cupsful of milk and two eggs. Sift the flour, sugar, salt and corn meal and baking powder; rub in lard cold, add the eggs well beaten, then the milk. Mix into a moderate- ly stiff batter. Pour it into well greased shallow taving pans; pie tins are suitable. Bake from thirty to forty minutes.

HALIFAX THE OCEAN PORT FOR C. P. R.

MONTREAL, Nov. 27.—The opinion prevails here that the Canadian Pacific Railway intends to make Halifax the ocean port for their passenger business. It is now known that the C. P. R. will build a new line across Maine and Megantic to a point near Centerville in New Brunswick and from thence to Chipman and Moncton. A look at the map will show this to be as straight as the crow flies and will be by all odds the shortest railway line from Montreal to Moncton. From Moncton it is understood that the C. P. R. have likewise plans for reaching the port of Halifax by a line having the lowest possible grades, the intention of the company being to secure a 15-hour service between Montreal and Halifax; this line to be especially used for fast freight, passenger and mails.
