SCHNEIDER CUP FLIER SETS 404 MILES AN HOUR RECORD

Touching a new record, the fastest man has ever before travelled, Flight Lieut. G. H. Stainforth (IN SET) put his lean powerful supermarine aeroplane over the Calshot course in the British Schneider Cup trials Sunday, Sept. 13, at 404 m. p. h. Also in four of six straightaway runs his average speed set a new world speed mark of 379.05 miles an hour. Former record was held by Squadron Leader A. H. Orlebar of the last British Cup team, with 357.7 miles an hour. Stainforth's machine is shown in the photograph as seen during recent trials preparatory to the cup tests.
