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Active Year For Charlottetown Board Of Trade

Comprehensive Reports Submitted At Annual Meeting. Coun. Samuel Kennedy Elected Pres- ident For Ensuing Year.

JAPS BURN NEWSPAPER BUILDING

TSINGTAO, China, Jan. 13.—(A. P.)—Five hundred steel helmeted marines, carrying fixed bayonets, patrolled the streets of Tsingtao today while thousands of Chinese fled the city in fear of possible recurrence of yesterday's rioting.

Late tonight the Japanese authorities were satisfied that quiet had been restored, and the Marine contingent was returned to warships in the harbor.

The trouble started when the Chinese newspaper Kuo Jih Pao said the recent attempt by a Korean on the life of Emperor Hirohito indicated Korea's desire for independence.

Japanese residents interpreted this as an insult to the Emperor and stormed the newspaper plant. Firing revolvers, they thronged into the building, and the Chinese staff fled. Attempts were made to burn the place, but they were unsuccessful.

Later several thousand Japanese paraded behind their nation's flag, demanding further action against the newspaper. After the parade the demonstrators made another attack, this time burning the newspaper building and the headquarters of the Kuomintang (Chinese Nationalist party) as well.

FRANKFORT-AM-MAIN, Germany, Jan. 13.—(A.P.)—Former Queen Sophie of Greece, sister of former Kaiser Wilhelm, died at a clinic here tonight after a lingering illness from cancer. She was 61 years old.

The one-time Queen of the Hellenes had lived in Florence, Italy, since the death of her husband, King Constantine, in exile at Palermo on January 11, 1923. She came to Frankfort, last November to seek the advice of a specialist, who operated on November 12, but found

WATERWAYS PROJECT BEING DISCUSSED

Ottawa Scene of Con- ferences On Deep Waterways Propo- sal Between Canada and United States.

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 13.—Carrying out the expressed desire of the Dominion Government to discuss with Ontario and Quebec the phases of the St. Lawrence Waterways project in which each province was primarily interested, Dominion and Ontario representatives conferred at morning and afternoon meetings today.

The international section from Prescott to the Quebec boundary in the power development of which Ontario is interested—was considered. Satisfactory progress was made and another meeting will likely take place next week.

Discussions with Quebec are expected to be held shortly. While the Quebec legislature is still in session, a Dominion-Quebec meeting may be held before the Dominion Parliament opens early next month. Quebec is concerned largely on the development from Lake St. Francis to Montreal.

Treaty negotiations on the deep waterways proposal opened between Canada and the United States some months ago.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—With little ceremony, a hero found his last resting place in a back lot here today, while a group of sobbing children watched the interment. It was the burial of a fourteen-years-old Irish setter known as Mike, whose collar bore a plate with the inscription "life saver."

In 1924 Mike was presented with a medal in appreciation for his gallant rescue of two boys, his playmates, who would have drifted helplessly to sea on a raft if the dog had not heard their screams, paddled to the raft and towed one child to safety, while his barking brought about the rescue of the other boy.

Free Status For Burma

LONDON, Jan. 13.—(A.P.)—Burma received a pledge of responsible government by evolutionary process from Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald at the concluding session of the Business Round Table Conference today.

If Burma decides at a National election to separate from India, Britain will grant her a constitution providing for a legislature and for a governor to be appointed by the British crown who will exercise wide "reserved" powers in dealing with foreign affairs, defense and finance.

MUSSOLINI ADVISES EUROPE

To Cancel Reparations As First Step To World's Economic Recovery.

MILAN, Italy, Jan. 13.—(A.P.)—Premier Mussolini advised Europe in an article in his newspaper, Popolo D'Italia, today to cancel reparations as the first step to the world's economic recovery.

The article, which was unsigned, but was known to be from Il Duce's pen, said this undoubtedly would leave the United States in such a position that it would have to follow suit by cancelling war debts.

It was Mussolini's second pronouncement through his Milan newspaper within three days of his personal views and therefore of the official policy of Italy.

ONTARIO MAY FLOAT LOAN

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 13.—The Ontario Government is considering the flotation of an internal loan of not more than \$20,000,000, Hon. E. A. Dunlop, Provincial Treasurer stated today.

The Cabinet has considered this matter informally but has made no arrangements. The exact amount has not been decided upon but it will not be more than \$20,000,000 and will be kept wholly in Canada. We do not know when the bonds will be placed on the market but expect it will be in the near future.

Destroyers Off To The Indies

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—All four of Canada's destroyers were today on the high seas, bound for the West Indies where, eventually the two flotillas will meet and cruise in consort. H. M. C. S. Skeena and H. M. C. S. Vancouver left San Diego, Calif., today and headed for Manzanillo, Mexico, where they are scheduled to arrive next Sunday.

Yesterday H. M. C. S. Saguenay and H. M. C. S. Champlain left their home station at Halifax, N. S., en route to Bermuda, the first stage of their trip to the islands of the Caribbean. The four ships will unite into one Canadian flotilla on February 3 at Montego Bay, B. W. I.

Hermit Trapper Defies Capture

Gun-Fighting From Lonely Cabin On Yukon Trail Staves Off Two Attempts Of Mounties—Is Want- ed For Shooting Of Constable.

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 13.—Mounted police at Aklavik laid plans tonight for the capture of a hermit trapper whose gun-fighting from his lonely cabin, 80 miles up the old Yukon trail has staved off two attempts to arrest him.

A report received at Royal Canadian Mounted Police headquarters here today told of a futile raid by eight "Mounties" on the cabin of Albert Johnson, wanted for the shooting of Constable A. W. King, more than a week ago. The police posse attacked Johnson's stronghold for 15 hours with bombs and gunfire and were forced to retire when their food supply ran low.

The party was headed by Inspector A. N. Eames, of the Aklavik division of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. They left for Johnson's cabin eight days ago. When they reached his isolated cab-

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Without A Country

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 13.—(By The Canadian Press)—Cecil James Scott, aged 29, colored, will be held in Halifax on his arrival there until such time as the Department of Immigration can establish his nationality. Scott referred to as "the man without a country," was deported on the steamer Brosmud to Bermuda. The authorities at Bermuda, however, denied that he was a citizen of the Island. He was brought back, and will ultimately be returned to the immigration authorities at Halifax.

When Scott was originally deported he had a Bermudian passport, and it is presumed it was by this passport he was admitted into Canada. It now develops that the passport was evidently obtained illegally.

FOUND GUILTY BY JURY IN SUPREME COURT

In the Supreme Court yesterday Frederick J. Lambe, pleading "not guilty" to the crime of rape, was tried and convicted before the Chief Justice and a jury. The prisoner, who was unrepresented by counsel made a brief statement in his own defense. The Court signified willingness to appoint counsel, but no members of the Bar were present except the Attorney General and Mr. Alban Farmer, representing the Crown. The public was excluded from the hearing.

The petit jury on the case were Ewen Lamont, (foreman); Waldron Baine; Duncan Martin; Charles Rowe; Everett Johnson; Patrick Cullaghan; Peter Toole; Donald B. Gordon; Milton J. Furness; John Gordon; Leigh Stewart; Roderick McLeod.

The Grand Jury brought in no bill of indictment in the case of The King Vs. Smith and Loughran.

Christopher Keefe and Richard Keefe, charged with breaking and entering McLean's store at North Wiltshire and stealing therefrom and a second count of retaining stolen goods both pleaded "not guilty" and said they would be ready for trial on Monday.

The Court meets this morning at 11 o'clock to hear an application from the Attorney General.

Trial of the criminal cases will be continued on Monday.

FOURTEEN LOSE LIVES IN BLIZZARD

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Fourteen persons were reported dead today in tornados as midwinter storms swept eastward with a blizzard, high winds and bitter cold in their wake.
