IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM BALLEM

On the morning of Friday September 21, 1923 William Balleem of Mount Allison, Prince Edward Island, passed peacefully away from the scenes of earthly labours to the fullest joys of glory.

He was the son of the late George Balleem and Mary Bishop his wife and was born at Murray Harbour in the year 1836.

He married Leonor Jenkins who survives him and they resided at Mount Allison Lot 49 where they raised their family and built up a comfortable homestead.

The family consisted of four sons and five daughters. One daughter Mrs. Daniel MacNeil of Village Green passed away some years ago. The surviving members of the family are Mrs. James MacCallum of Southport, Mrs. George D. Jenkins Mount Herbert, Mrs. John Loring Bath Me. U. S. A. Mrs. Frank L. Drake Charlottetown, George M. Southport, Joshua W. on the homestead, Henry C. of Sydney, N. S. and Dr. John Cedric of New Glasgow. There are also twenty-eight grandchildren and twenty one great-grandchildren. These all together with a large number of other relatives and friends miss now the kindly counsel the humble prayerfulness and true example of one who was deeply interested in their temporal and eternal welfare.

Mr. Balleem had engaged in the ship-building trade when that industry flourished in this province, and many of the finest ships that left our yards were designed by him.

He possessed qualities which fitted him to become a master tradesman, a trusted citizen, a devoted husband and father, and a true friend. Above and beyond all else, however, we would speak of his christian character and spiritual knowledge by which he was enabled to enter into the heavenly places in Christ Jesus his Lord. In his youth he received the assurance of God's loving favour and the Holy Spirit, which revealed to him the hidden mysteries of divine love, and filled his heart with joy and praise.

His firm faith, his sure and steadfast hope, and his tender christian charity marked him for a life of service within the church. During the ministry of the late Rev. John Goodwill he was ordained to the eldership of the Church of Scotland. Worshipers at Birch Hill Kirk will cherish the memory of Uncle William Balleem. As he was known to so many. For several years he was superintendent of the Sabbath School, and many men and women attribute much of their moral spiritual training to his impressive words. He also took great interest and gave valuable instruction in the service of praise.

He had always enjoyed good health and was only laid aside about a week before his departure. The outstanding feature of his later days was the closeness of his soul to the Lord Jesus, and in the sanctifying and perfecting power of that union he was before us as the one of whom David speaks in Psalm 37. Recruiting Naval Cadets.

Lieutenant H. J. Hibbard, R. C. N., of the Department of Defence, has arrived in Charlottetown from Ottawa in connection with the organization of the Royal Canadian Naval Reserves. The new unit will be composed of 500 men, who will receive training at Halifax and Esquimaux and will be recruited from nine cities of the Dominion, Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Halifax, Charlottetown, Lunenburg, Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert. Candidates will enroll for five years and will carry out 42 days of training afloat or ashore the first year and 14 days annually thereafter. Uniforms will be supplied free. Each recruit will receive a retainer of \$48 a year and if advanced to leading seaman or leading stoker will receive \$64. When he becomes a petty officer he will receive \$80 a year and a long service gratuity of \$16 will be paid to other than officers after the completion of 20 years satisfactory service.
