

Large Crowd Witness Great Racing In Night Meet Saturday

Favourites came through in two out of three classes at the night racing meet held at the Exhibition Track on Saturday night with Johnny Kalmuck and Nell Kalmuck capturing the 2:28 pace and classified trot and pace in straight heats for expected wins and Kelly's Nightmare, trotting a storm all the way and taking a new race record of 2:13 3-5 in the second heat coming on to win the Classified Trot after finishing second to the favored Lusticia in the first mile.

The largest crowd to witness a night racing meet here this season, augmented by a large number of tourists saw racing of the highest order in each and every heat on the program. The eight heats raced were run off in an efficient manner with Starter Russell Abbott coming through with a great job on the starting gate. Johnny Kalmuck had too much pace for the field in winning the feature event on the card, the 2:28 pace. In the first two heats he won handily but in the final mile just barely staved off the rush of Mac Watson who finished with an amazing burst of speed that just failed to catch the flying leader with the mile being negotiated in 2:19.

Kelly's Nightmare, instigator of many upset victories in other races came through with another like performance in winning the Classified Trot. Lusticia, the favorite among the betters snapped the rail on the first turn of the first mile to make every post a winning one from there on as she beat off the challenge of Billy Kalmuck in the stretch to win by a comfortable margin but in the second mile the Nightmare stepped into the picture. Winding up sixth in the first mile, the Bishop-owned mare trotted to the front of the field on the backstretch the second time around in the second mile to head. Lusticia in the stretch. In the third mile it was much the same story. The winner made her move at the same time and place with Speedwell Guy moving up into the runner-up spot in the race to the wire.

The smooth trotting Nell Kalmuck was the second mare to get herself a new mark in winning the Classified trot and pace in straight heats trotting the second mile in 2:12 1-5 to displace her former mark of 2:14 3-4. In the first mile Driver Willard Kelly held his horse in seventh place until the seven-eighths pole had been reached and then moved down the field in the stretch. In the second and final heat, it was Nell all the way with Scotty Budlong again second and O.U. Volo third in the seven horse

M.A.H.A. Holds Summer Meeting

HALIFAX, Aug. 1 — (CP) — The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association will operate senior, intermediate and junior league with each team having a limit of 25 players, it was decided here Saturday at a summer meeting of the Association.

President Charles Campbell announced that the next annual meeting of the Association will be held at Sydney, Sept. 24 and 25, when the organization will celebrate its 25th anniversary.

The Association will operate two senior divisions, Senior "A" and Senior "B" when the juniors will also be divided into two sections. There will only be one class in the intermediate group.

It was decided by Association executives to adopt the 25 player limit for each team as proposed by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association at Toronto last spring.

Under the new registration plan, teams may only sign 18 players at one time but will be allowed to have seven player replacements during the season. Final selection of players must be submitted to the Association by Jan. 25.

President Campbell said registered playing certificates must be held by all players before making first appearance with respective teams.

Minor groups which include bantam, midget and juvenile leagues will not be effected by the registration plan. They will continue to sign only 18 players as in previous years.

(By The Canadian Press) FREDERICTON, Aug. 1 — With their veteran captain, George Walters, leading the way, the 12-man squad representing the Prince Edward Island Abegweits Amateur Athletic Club won the Maritime track and field championship Saturday.

The meet, sponsored by the Panther Athletic Association of Fredericton, in conjunction with the provincial department of physical fitness, was the outstanding event on the final day's program of Fredericton's centennial celebration.

The Abbies scored a total of 54 points in copping the championship, followed by the Antigonish Highland Society with 34 markers. The Fredericton Panthers were third in team totals with 21

points, while the young Lancaster Athletic Association from West Saint John came next with 16.

The high-point man for the day was Walters, former Lunenburg star and now of Charlottetown, who put together three first places and a third for 16 points. Walters also set the only new record when he smashed his own javelin mark, tossing the slender spear 197 feet, seven inches and breaking his old record of 185 feet, 11 inches, set in 1936 at Antigonish.

His teammate, W. Brawley, came next in the individual scoring list with 13 points, made up of two firsts and a second. Gordon McDonald, Antigonish, was third with a first and two seconds for a total of 11 points.
