

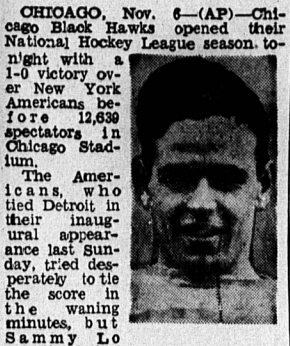

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Chicago Black Hawks opened their National Hockey League season tonight with a 1-0 victory over New York Americans before 12,639 spectators in Chicago Stadium.

Roosevelt Pledges U. S. Determination

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—While representatives of 35 nations applauded, President Roosevelt pledged today that no "misguided" industrialists, or labor leader shall prevail against the defence production of the United States and its "unlimited commitment that there shall be a free world."

Warning that the United States is prepared to go all the way to bring about Hitler's downfall, the President told the final session of the International Labor Office conference that the United States must make "full sacrifices" now or postpone the day of "real sacrifice" as did the French "until it is too late."

The President spoke from the east room of the White House before 250 delegates to the conference established by the League of Nations to improve the standard of living of workers the world over.

Air Minister Reviews R.C.A.F. Recruiting

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.—(CP)—Air Minister Ralston said in the House of Commons here today the Air Force had a special recruiting program for men from 18 to 25 years of age. He estimated there might be a reserve of 38,575 men in those age groups still available for air force enlistment and who had the necessary physical and education qualifications.

He also estimated 26,000 men reach the age of completed junior matriculation each year and of these possibly 13,000 were fit and willing to serve in the air force as pilots and observers.

"There will be a deficiency because we will require many more than 13,000 if we take only those coming in this year," he said.

Part of the deficiency might be met by bringing men up to educational standards and part by drawing on the backlog of 38,000 now in age groups up to 25. Men up to 32 years of age could also be used.

"The sky is the limit," he said. "We will take as aircrew all the young men of Canada who are willing and able to serve and we make no limit anywhere."

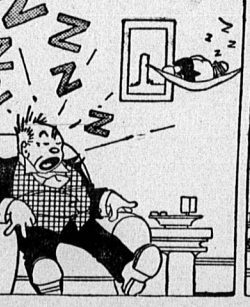
