LEAVES TO RE-JOIN SHIP—1st Class Stoker James Weatherbie of Charlottetown leaves this morning for the mainland to rejoin his ship. He spent 28 days leave at his home here. Before returning to Canada recently he served with the Royal Canadian Navy in England, operating in that area for 10 months.

WILL PRESENT ESTIMATES TONIGHT—Estimates for 1941 will be presented at a special meeting of the city council tonight. It is thought the council will have the estimates passed Monday but committees did not complete the work of revision in time.

BIG CROWD AT DANCE—The regular Tuesday night dance was held at the Canadian Legion War Services Hut last night with another large crowd composed of soldiers, sailors and air force men in attendance. Mr. Arthur G. Bruce is the director. Last night music was furnished by Bill Moreside's Orchestra.

STARCH FACTORIES TO OPEN—Four starch factories in this province will re-open as soon as roads and weather conditions permit, it was announced yesterday. The plants, located at St. Peter's, Baltic, Murray Harbour and Humber River, ground more than 300,000 bushels of tubers into starch last fall. Low prices for table stock and large supplies coupled with a good demand for the starch for starch led to the decision to re-open. It is unusual for the starch factories to operate except for a short time in the fall, years when potato prices are good the plants do not open.

INTERESTING RELICS—Interesting relics in the possession of Mrs. H. A. Messervy, city, are fragments of the famed rock of Gibraltar, which were brought here by her grandfather, John Ross, of the 79th Cameron Highlanders. One piece is a slab of the unpolished rock, as solid as metal, while smaller fragments have been polished and carved into unique earrings, ring stones, and a heart-shaped pendant. Mr. Ross, a native of Skye and a veteran of Sebastopol, was stationed at Gibraltar with his family, and it was there, in 1844, that his daughter Euphemia, Mrs. Messervy's grandmother, was born. After long and honorable service in the army, Mr. Ross came to this Province at the age of 60, and settled in Charlottetown, Euphemia marrying Capt. John Nicholson. The pieces of rock and other treasured souvenirs, including Mr. Ross's medals, were given to Mrs. Messervy by her father, Mr. John M. Nicholson, City.

Judgment and Execution Act

On motion of Premier Campbell, the House went into committee

Only slight damage was caused early yesterday morning in a fire at the Royal Air Force Camp at the Charlottetown Airport. The blaze, however, and was extinguished in ten minutes. R. F. officials said. An overheated furnace set fire to some wood work, it was reported. Fire fighting equipment at the airport was used.

2nd reading In Legislature Yesterday

Legislative Assembly, April 1. The House met at 3:50 p.m. "An Act Respecting Change of Name" introduced by Premier Campbell was received and read. Premier Campbell moved introduction of a bill to amend the Succession Duty Act. He explained that with the problematical case of millionaires. It extends the existing provisions to cover the case of widows and dependent children of deceased millionaires. He also gave notice of the introduction of a bill to amend the Income Tax Act.

Certiorari Act On motion of Premier Campbell the House went into committee with Mr. Jones in the chair, on an Act to amend the Habeas Corpus and Certiorari Act. The bill makes provision for the giving of security for costs on applications for certiorari. It also provides: "If any summary proceedings shall be removed into the Supreme Court and the conviction or other judgment in such proceedings shall be quashed by reason of a defect in the summons to the accused or in the service of such summons, the defendant shall be liable for the costs of the accused as such proceedings then and in every such case only such part of the proceedings as were subsequent to the defect in the summons or service shall be held to be invalid, and the Court shall remit the information or complaint to the Magistrate or Court of origin with leave to proceed thereupon as if no proceedings had been taken subsequently to the defect complained of."

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment. On motion of Premier Campbell, the House went into committee with Mr. Foley in the chair on an Act to amend the Evidence Act. The bill has reference to the payment of insurance moneys payable on the death of members of the Active Service forces. It provides that certificates signed by certain designated military naval and air officers shall be prima facie proof of the death of the person in question. It was reported agreed to with amendment.

Overseas Children On motion of Premier Campbell, the House went into committee with Mr. Baker in the chair, on an Act to amend the Guardianship of Overseas Children in Prince Edward Island. The bill provides: "For the purpose of assuring adequate care and protection to any child in the Province who has come from the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland on the first day of September, 1939, and for whom there is in this Province a guardian or guardian, the Deputy Provincial Secretary is empowered to act in all matters, as parent or guardian of the child, within the scope of the Act, and during the period of his stay in the Province, or until the consummation of the transfer of guardianship to another person, to do such things as may be necessary to return to his legal parent or guardian, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Deputy Provincial Secretary is authorized to give consent to medical care, hospitalization, and surgical operations, where such legal consent is necessary, but said consent shall not be given to any child from any care, when, in the opinion of the Deputy Provincial Secretary, it is in the best interests of the child so to do, and to a child such child in any approved foster home."

The powers conferred upon the Deputy Provincial Secretary by this Act shall not be used in any of the following ways: (a) for the purpose of giving consent to marriage or adoption of the child; (b) for the purpose of preventing the return of the child to his legal parents or legal guardians outside the jurisdiction of the Province when the legal parent or guardian requests it; (c) for the purpose of interfering in any way with any property, real or personal, belonging to the child."

Appeal Provisions Added The bill was discussed by Premier Campbell and Mr. MacPhee, the latter pointing out certain ambiguities in the phraseology. He also drew attention to the arbitrary powers conferred on the Deputy Provincial Secretary. The Premier explained that the bill was a modern one, which every provincial legislature was being asked to put through. He agreed that in theory the powers vested were arbitrary, but said that cases had already arisen where it was necessary to make changes in foster homes. The government had to assume the responsibility of acting. By authorizing the Deputy Provincial Secretary to act, it is presumed that he will do so with the consent of the government.

Mr. MacPhee suggested providing for the right of appeal, in such cases, to the Judge in Chancery. He agreed that such safeguard might be entirely unnecessary, but it should be there as a protection against bureaucratic interference. The Premier concurred. Mr. MacPhee also suggested an amendment, which was adopted, providing for such appeal. Hon. Dr. MacMillan cited the experience of the Children's Aid Society, when it becomes necessary to make changes in foster homes. The Society is to act in such circumstances through the Magistrate. He believed that in this case it was proper to have authority vested in the Deputy Provincial Secretary. On motion of Premier Campbell a further amendment was adopted, to provide for the Act coming into effect by proclamation by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. It was then reported agreed to with amendment.

Judgment and Execution Act On motion of Premier Campbell, the House went into committee

On the Order Paper in the Legislature yesterday appeared one of the following questions of general public interest to which the Government will be asked to table replies: Hon. Dr. MacMillan: "What was the total amount of unpaid bills owing by the Government at the end of the last fiscal year? Specify the amount owing to each Department. The names and addresses of persons having claims against the Government in respect of lands appropriated for highway or other purposes or for damages, with approximate amount of each claim, at the end of the last fiscal year. (1) What reduction, if any, has been made in the staff of the Tax Branch as the result of the Dominion Government's assumption of the Provincial Income Tax collections? (2) Give the names of the officials, if any, whose services have been dispensed with for the above reason. (3) Give the annual payroll saving in the Tax Office as a result of the Dominion Government now collecting Provincial Income Tax. Mr. MacPhee: (1) What effort, if any, has the Government made during the past year towards the establishment of any war time industry or industries in this Province? (2) Table all correspondence between the Government and Federal Ministers or officials, or other persons in connection therewith. (3) Was a Board appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council under the provisions of Sec. 3 of the Agricultural Products Marketing Act? (4) If yes, give the names and addresses of the members of the said Board. (5) What remuneration has been paid or provided in respect of each member of said Board, including travelling expenses, if any? (6) What powers have been vested in said Board by virtue of the provisions of Sec. 5 of said Act, or otherwise? (7) Table a complete report of the said Board's activities. (8) What marketing scheme, if any, has been approved by said Board, and what action has been taken by the Government in relation thereto? Give the names and addresses of all lawyers employed by every department of government during the year 1940 in connection with all legal work whether as counsel, attorney, barrister, solicitor, Crown prosecutor, Magistrate, law clerk, or in any other capacity, with the total amount paid to each by each department. Mr. W. A. Stewart: (1) Was any new building constructed at Falconwood Hospital in the year 1940? (2) Was said building constructed by tender and if not, on what basis? (3) What was the total cost of said building (a) for labor, (b) for materials. (4) What present or intended use is being or will be made of the Bank of Canada building purchased by the Government, and what departments, or department of government service are, or are intended to be quartered there? (2) Has the Government made plans for alterations to said building and what is the estimated cost of same? (3) Is the work being done to be done by tender, and if not, on what basis? (1) State the kinds of goods and supplies for Falconwood Hospital and Falconwood Infirmary purchased by tender during the year 1940, with the total cost of each kind of goods and supplies purchased. (2) State the kind and amount of goods and supplies for said institutions otherwise than by tender during said year with the total cost of each kind of goods. (3) In the case of goods or supplies for said institutions for which tenders were called, state the names of the persons or firms invited to tender in respect of each tender called.

Will discuss Joint Czechoslovak Polish State

OTTAWA, April 1.—(CP)—A spokesman for General Wladyslaw Sikorski, newly arrived from Britain, said today the Polish leader would discuss the post-war formation of a joint Polish-Czechoslovakian state with President Roosevelt when he visits Washington in the near future. The basis for the federation has already been prepared, the press was told by Major Victor Cazalet, member of the British House of Commons and liaison man between General Sikorski and Prime Minister Churchill. The General declined to say any statement until after he had met the Polish and Prime Minister Mackenzie King. He doesn't speak English. Major Cazalet said General Sikorski said the Polish government were "very much for" the plan to federate two of the nations now under Nazi domination. Although both would retain their independence, there would be free trade and a common foreign policy. It would be a nation of 50,000,000 people, and the right to join would be thrown open to neighboring nations. Major Cazalet described Sikorski as "much the most important allied leader in England." He said he commanded a Polish army in the war against the Bolsheviks in 1919 but that he didn't get into the brief conflict with the Germans in 1939. His visit will be one of "a few weeks" because the commander-in-chief of Poland's fighting forces wants to get back to the battle front. He will speak to the American and Canadian leaders as chiefs of about 20,000 troops massed in Sicily and other troops in Egypt, 10,000 airmen in England and 1,500 men in the allied navies. Cazalet said that in trying to press the point, Poland is playing the game of the British, to recall that between 30 and 40 German divisions are kept in his country with Mr. Molotov in the chair on an Act to amend the Judgment and Execution Act. The bill amends the existing legislation to conform with present practice in filing minutes of judgment, also to bring the form of statute execution into line with the practice in England. It was reported agreed to without amendment. At 5 o'clock the House adjourned to meet at 3 p.m. Wednesday.
