**ISLAND GRADUATE**—The name of Edith Bertha Gordon Thomson appears in the list of graduates from Toronto University. Miss Thomson was awarded the Harry C. Crowe Scholarship on the completion of her training at the P. E. I. Hospital, and last September entered the above University to take the course in Hospital Administration and Teaching, in which she graduated, making a good showing in all subjects. After a week's vacation with her parents at the home of her sister Mrs. (Rev.) B. E. Newnham, Canfield, Ont., she accepted a position in the Toronto General Hospital for the summer, and entered on her duties May 30th. Miss Thomson is a daughter of Rev. W. A. **CADETS CHURCH PARADE**—Yesterday morning the West Kent School Cadets with Captain Kenneth MacDonald in command, held their annual church parade. Marching at the school, they proceeded up Kent Street to Queen, turned down Queen to Grafton, from Grafton they proceeded to Prince Street, to Trinity United Church for the morning service. The service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Ramsay who preached, and the Rev. Mr. Brown also addressed the boys. On the return, the salute was taken by Lieutenant Governor Heertz at the Bank of Montreal. Many favourable comments on the smart appearance of the cadets were passed by the large number of citizens who viewed the parade. **—BAD NARROW ESCAPE—**Mr. El Gaudet had a narrow escape from instant death when he was taking down an electric wire on the Marine Wharf at Summerside on Friday afternoon. The Marine and Fisheries Department are making some improvements on the wharf and a derrick was being erected for the purpose of carrying the heavy poles, etc., for making certain repairs. It was found necessary to remove the electric wires which were attached to the light house beacon to allow the derrick to pass. Mr. Gaudet was engaged in taking down the wires which were at right angles to one another, being fastened from the coal sheds to the potato warehouses. The first one came off without any trouble but the second wire sprang away and struck Mr. Gaudet with terrible force under the chin. He lost his hold on the ladder and feeling himself falling backwards he jumped to the ground, about 18 feet, and landed square on his feet. He immediately collapsed and remained in

a semi-conscious state for about an hour. Men who saw the accident said it was a miracle that the man was not killed. He was taken home about 3:30 p. m. and although suffering from shock is apparently none the worse for his terrible experience.—S.

Her pleasing and friendly disposition soon won her many friends and in a short time she became actively engaged in Church work, being of great assistance in such auxiliaries as the W. C. T. U., Y. M. C. A., and Ladies Auxiliary of the Protestant Orphanage. She was also a prominent member of the Women's Liberal Club.  
Two daughters survive, Mrs. Mabel Taylor of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who was with her mother when she passed away; Mrs. Alice Markle also of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who was home a short time ago and one son Arthur of Toronto, Ont., who visited his mother only a week ago.  
To Mr. Doull and the members of the family the Guardian extends heartfelt sympathy.

**ROAD ACCIDENT**—Meeting in a cloud of dust on the road between Dundas and Dingwell's Mills Saturday afternoon, two motor cars were badly smashed and the occupants of one car, Messrs Willard Jordan and Russell McBeth were painfully injured. Mr. McBeth being taken to Montague where his head was found to be so severely cut that it required sixteen stitches to close the wound. Mr. Jordan was brought to the Prince Edward Island Hospital suffering from a fractured knee cap. He was reported resting comfortably last evening. Messrs J. J. McPhee, preventive officer and J. C. McDonald, prohibition inspectors, occupants of the other car were badly shaken up. Both cars were damaged beyond repair.

Mr. Gunsaulus had many friends in the city and his passing will be received with regret. He served in Wellington, New Zealand, and Singapore, Straits Settlements, before coming to Halifax, and retired from the consular service on leaving this city.—Halifax Herald—The sympathy of many friends here will go out to Mr. Gunsaulus, American Consul, of Charlottetown, who is a son of the deceased.

The following telegram from Mr. W. J. O'Leary at Dayton, Ohio, regarding the condition of his brother Bishop O'Leary of Charlottetown, was received early last evening by Dr. W. J. MacMillan:

"Bishop O'Leary suffered a coronary embolus with extreme angina and collapse and severe drop in blood pressure. At 1:15 today his pulse was 128 but he was still cyanotic. Prognosis unfavorable and recovery not expected unless blood pressure rises."

News of the critical condition of Bishop O'Leary during his visit to Ohio was received on Monday and caused much disquietude in Charlottetown and throughout the Province generally. Yesterday's telegram indicates that His Lordship's condition remains very serious and further word will be awaited with the greatest anxiety.

Two Maritime Interscholastic records were by the boards at the Provincial Interscholastic Athletic Meet held at the Abegweit Grounds last evening when Maurice Lodge, city, representing Prince of Wales College, won the mile run in 4:57 1-2, bettering the existing record by about ten seconds and a half, and George Ayers, city, also representing P. W. C. cleared the bar in the running high jump at 5 feet 4 1-2 inches. The latter record was broken twice, first by Kenneth Beer, 16 year old Montague had competing for Prince of Wales College, in the intermediate event, who after holding the championship for about half an hour was dethroned by Ayers.  
The Summerside team led with 73 points, West Kent coming second with 71, followed by P. W. C. with 49, and S. D. U. with 36. George Ayers was the winner of the senior all-around championship, Kenneth Beer of the intermediate, and Bob Clark, Summerside of the junior.

Prominent among the contestants and carrying off a large number of firsts was Emmet Donahoe, Souris, representing S. D. U. This young athlete is the son of the late Dr. Robert Donahoe famous all-around athlete of a number of years ago. Most spectacular of all events was the winning of the mile run by "Sparky" Lodge in record time. The long smooth stride, the steady and unwavering gait, and the brilliant finish combined to make the event one of the most pleasing to watch of the events contested last night.  
The crowd in attendance was very large, but the absence of parents of many contestants was a matter of regret. Great interest was taken in each event.  
His Worship Mayor Prowse at the close of the meet presented the winners with their prizes.

**BATTERIES INSPECTED**—Brigadier General Gibson and Col. Harris, Halifax, last night inspected No. 2 and No. 8 Medium Batteries at the Drill Hall. Both batteries passed inspection and will entrain for Fetsuway tomorrow afternoon, (Saturday).

A big seizure of liquor was made at daybreak Thursday morning in the woods at Mont Carmel by Customs Officers Platts and McDonald and Prohibition Officers Miller and Mann. In a cache in the woods covered up with brush was hidden forty-nine five gallon kegs of rum and fifty cases of whiskey. The officers have no clue as to the owners of the liquor. It took them some considerable time to transfer the seizure into automobiles and a truck. The liquor was brought into Summerside about 11 o'clock that morning and stored in the cellar of the Customs House pending instructions from Ottawa, S.
