The Duke of Richmond.

Q. Who was the Duke of Richmond?

A. The Duke of Richmond was the twenty-seventh Governor General of Canada for the brief period from 1818 to 1819, when he died from hydrophobia caused by the bite of a pet fox. He was with the Duke of Wellington at the Battle of Waterloo, and gave the famous oath on the eve of the battle immortalized by Byron. His administration of Canadian affairs was a disturbed one on account of his interference with the Assembly, although the Canadian people were highly flattered at the appointment of an Englishman of such distinction.
