The recurrence of incendiary fires in the city calls for a sharp outlook on the part of the police. As a matter of fact there should be a careful investigation in all such cases, and the most painstaking effort to arrest and punish the guilty parties. Arson is a wicked crime, destructive to property, dangerous to life, and liable to produce a conflagration which might lay a large part of the city in ashes. There are quite enough fires that human care and foresight cannot prevent. There must be no tolerance for the incendiary in Charlottetown.

Simultaneously in the United States and France the automobile mowing machine and harvester has this year appeared. It can do anything that can be done with the ordinary mower or that a reaper and a pair of horses can do. It does not get tired, or mind the heat of the sun, does not get frightened at passing railway trains, and the flies don't seem to bother it at all. When done cutting your grain or grass, if you want power for any other purpose, you can simply disengage the cutting apparatus and you have a portable agricultural engine for drawing loads about the farm, grinding feed, pumping water, sawing wood, or any other purpose. Gasoline is used for fuel. When not working there is no feed required and there is no expense for "keep."

The question of the low birth rate in Ontario has engaged the attention of the press and also of the pulpits in that Province as from year to year the vital statistics have been published. The Provincial Registrar's latest report shows that the births in the Province during the last year were but 20.7 per thousand, which is actually lower than the rate in France where the population has stood almost stationary for years. Almost as many people die in Ontario in a given time as are born there. Under such conditions it is of no use to blame the croods to the States, or the migration to the North west. The baby crop has been called "the crop that never falls" but it is a very scant crop in the big Province, and that is what is the matter with Ontario.
