SI HOONER CLEARED.—The schooner Henry H. Dicka which was discharging Island produce has cleared from Halifax port for Souris.

THE NORTHUMBERLAND.—The S. S. Northumberland docked at Charlottetown last evening at 6 o'clock.

LARGE MAIL.—An extra heavy mail was received in Charlottetown last night on account of the C. P.R. mail being missed the previous night; it coming in last night, with the other regular mail.

AN ISLAND BANKER.—Under the heading Banks and Bankers the Montreal Mail contains a portrait of Mr. J. F. McMillan, Manager of the Edmonton branch of the Royal Bank of Canada. The Mail says:—Mr. McMillan was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., in 1879, and was educated there, winning the senior scholarship for Charlottetown for entrance to the Prince of Wales College. In 1894 he entered the service of the Merchants Bank of Prince Edward Island. In 1905 he entered the service of the Canadian Bank of Commerce as manager at Summerside, P. E. I. From 1906 to 1909 Mr. McMillan was manager of the Royal Bank at Charlottetown, being transferred to Edmonton in 1909.

FOX NEWS.—Local fox-people will be interested to learn that laws prohibiting the exportation of live wild-caught foxes have either been introduced or will be passed by the various legislatures throughout the Dominion at their session this winter. This will mean that there will be no more foxes coming in from West or Alaska unless they are ranch-bred 1914 pups. The great demand for cross-fox furs, due to society's fad for them and the fact that hundreds of crosses have been captured this year, will cause the output next year to be smaller, and the prices will no doubt rise higher than ever. Persons who invest in cross foxes here should reap a substantial dividend in the future. A recent illustration showing the Duchess of Marlborough envisaged for votes pictures her wearing a set of cross fox furs, and a recent illustration shows one of the Royal Princesses wearing fox furs.
