\$5,000,000 For Strait Of Canso Ferry Facilities

OTTAWA, Jan. 18. — (CP) — Plans are being prepared for \$5,000,000 improvements to ferry facilities at the Strait of Canso, including the construction of a new ferry-boats, Transport Minister Chevrier said today.

The minister said proposals for a bridge or causeway over the narrow strip of water separating Cape Breton from the Nova Scotia mainland had been ruled out temporarily. Engineers had reported that the project was feasible, but Mr. Chevrier said the Government did not consider the expenditure warranted at this time.

Advocates of the causeway plan in Nova Scotia have been pushing it for many years, and a number of delegations have visited Ottawa on it. They claim it would relieve a bottleneck at the strait that affects such traffic as the output of Cape Breton's steel mills and coal mines, particularly when ice clogs the passage in winter.

But Mr. Chevrier said today that for the time being, any improvement at the strait would be by way of betterments to existing facilities.

The Government was given a \$5,000,000 appropriation for this purpose at the 1947 session of Parliament, and it now is having specifications drawn up for this new ferry and for work on its terminals.

The minister said it had not been determined yet how much of the appropriation would be spent on the ferry, but he indicated it would be considerably under the \$5,000,000 total. He pointed out the new Prince Edward Island carryer Abegweit cost less than this.

Mr. Chevrier said it would be some time before the contract is let out.

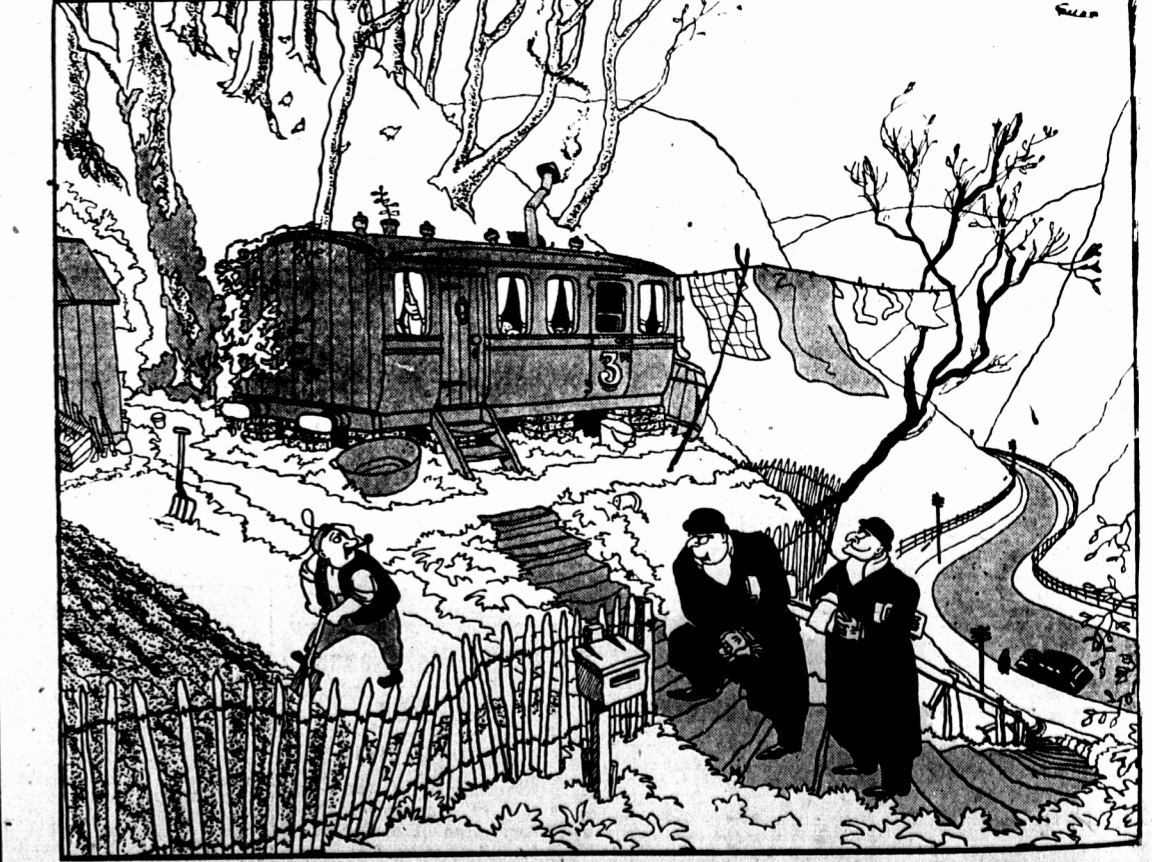
