King's Illness Recalls Visit As Midshipman

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 6.—The recent illness of King George recalled his visits to this old British port where he was well known, particularly when stationed here as a midshipman on the "Canada."

One of the outstanding incidents associated with His Majesty as a midshipman here was a sensational discovery of what was believed to be a plot to blow up the "Canada" with its royal sailor, and one of the men involved was afterwards said to have admitted the intention of himself and an accomplice to destroy the vessel.

Investigation of a burglary revealed a large supply of powerful dynamite hidden in a grip in a local hotel. The two occupants of the room, who gave their names as James Holmes and William Brecken, of Philadelphia, were arrested, and a railway baggage check in Holmes' possession was exchanged at the station for a large, white canvas bag, in which were found a new rubber floating suit, a quantity of copper wire, dynamite caps and detonators, with a number of small hooks, screws and chisels, and a small six-laurel revolver, similar to those used for exploding dynamite. At a subsequent investigation, it was discovered that the two prisoners had been roving nightily around the naval ships, including the "Canada" docked off the dockyard. The case aroused great excitement. Admiral Comrorall told the police that an attempt had been made to destroy naval property at Halifax, and that Sir Percy Sherwood, in charge of the secret service and Dominion police, had been informed that military and naval property here was in his department possessing information regarding the plot. When this discovery was made the Prince was ordered from Halifax to the West Indies.

Holmes and Brecken were sent up for trial on a charge of having explosives in their possession contrary to the law. Sir John Thompson, chief justice, found there was no law against their possessing dynamite in Canada, but the prisoners were convicted for creating a nuisance, and sentenced to six months each in the jail.

After his discharge from jail and before leaving for the United States, Brecken was quoted as saying: "It is just as well we were captured anyhow, as the thing we came here to do might have been far more serious, as we intended when coming here to blow up the H.M.S. "Canada" with the "Prince."

Bloodshed Ensues When Martial Law Proclaimed

BARRANQUILLA, Columbia, Dec. 7.—Ten persons were slain and twenty four wounded in a clash with soldiers last night at Cienega, as an outgrowth of the strike in the Santa Maria Banana region. Advice received here today indicated that there was bloodshed in other Banana towns. The immediate cause of the clashes was the proclamation of martial law which aroused the populace. The situation was returning to normal and the government was stated to be in control. Army aviators flew over the disturbed area and reported that several railway stations and farmhouses had been fired by rioters.

MARKET FOR WOODWORKING MACHINERY IN BRAZIL

There are three principal fields for the sale of woodworking machinery in Brazil.—The extensive furniture, saw-mill, and the sash and door and carpentry industries, says Mr. A. S. Bleakney, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Rio de Janeiro, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. There are considerable imports in Brazil of machinery, machines for industry, and tools and utensils of all kinds valued at \$2,107,798. There is practically no woodworking machinery made in the country, the machinery for the production of furniture, sashes and doors, and for saw-mills, is all imported. Belgium is the principal source of supply for saw-mill machinery, although Scandinavian and German machines are in evidence. In the furniture factories German and Scandinavian machines predominate, with the Belgian machines also commanding a good sale.
