Teasdale who was present also spoke. The majority present expressed their desire to revive the institution and promote the work of helping young men. The meeting was closed by Rev. Leo Williams.

It was announced that the next meeting will be held at an early date in January (to be published later,) at which meeting the annual election of officers will be held. Members will oblige the retiring executive by renewing their membership, and those wishing to join the Society to do so by applying to the Secretary before the meeting, if possible.

**City Council Meeting.**

The regular meeting of the city council was held last night. His Worship and all the Councillors were present. After the passing of a number of bills a communication from Mr. Walter Doull was read offering to repair the fire alarm for \$25.60. After considerable discussion on the repair of the alarm Councillor Crabbe moved, seconded by Councillor Nicholson that Mr. Doull put the entire fire alarm system in perfect working order to the satisfaction of the Mayor and His Worship was authorized on completion of the work to sign a cheque for \$25 payable to Mr. Doull. Carried.  
A petition from the residents of ward five for the removal of a light recently placed was heard.  
Coun. Crabbe moved, seconded by Coun. Taylor that the Councillors of ward five be a committee to remedy the difficulty. Carried.  
Coun. McCarron reported that the committee on printing recommended that Messrs Murley & Garmum's tender be accepted, it being the lowest, 85 cents a page.  
Coun. Crabbe called the attention of the board to the recommendations made by the Fire Board namely, the repairs to the Engine and the purchase of 500 feet additional hose. On motion of Coun. Crabbe the engine was ordered to be repaired at a cost of \$50. Coun. McCarron then moved a resolution that the engine be used only for fire purposes. Carried.  
Coun. Hoop asked for a light on Prince St. but the McCarron resolution prevented the grant.  
Coun. Nicholson made a similar request but it was decided not to grant any more lights this year. Council adjourned.
