ANGLo-GERMAN (Continued From Page 5.) avoidable, but peace depends on the spirit not only of German, but of English policy." The Verssische Zeitung says:—"As for the past, Sir Edward Grey con-firms rather than denied Captain Walter V. Fabers' assertion made in the house of commons on November 17th., that England had planned to land 150,000 troops on the continent against Germany. In regard to the future, actions must speak louder than words." The newspaper states that the world should wait and see whether Sir Edward's phrases as to England's desiring to hammer Germany will be repeated should Germany need to acquire a coaling station or a naval base on the coast of East Africa. The Koelnische Zeitung in a leading article says—"It cannot be said that the measures and forms chosen by English ministers during the summer tended to bring the relations of the two countries onto a better footing. Events show rather how deeply rooted are the opposing views of the two countries. English leaders in their blind partnership adopted the French side. Let us forget the past and hope for the fulfilment of British assurances that German affairs will now be judged more justly in England."
