BLAME NOT THE TEACHERS. In an article in yesterday's GUARDIAN descriptive of the Summer School of Science at Moncton, the writer, one of P.E. Island's most progressive teachers, says: P. E. Island had three representatives at the school. It causes a blush of shame to mantle the cheek when one has to respond to the question, "why do not more of the P. E. Island teachers attend?" especially when you are bound in truth to reply that there are two reasons.

We presume the writer of the above paragraph has no desire to lay much of the blame at the door of P. E. Island teachers. It would be manifestly unfair to do so. A teacher might be induced to attend such gatherings through desire for self improvement—and for this purpose the Summer School offers eminent advantages—but the same would hold true of clergymen, doctors, lawyers or merchants; men very rarely seen within the precincts of the Summer School of Science.

Idealists will say that a teacher owes it to humanity to awaken the intelligence of those placed under his care, to diffuse knowledge as a safe guard to the state, and that no thought of filthy lucre should darken the nobler motives of his mind.

True, the teaching profession is a high and dignified one. The school teacher is engaged in an honorable calling. He is influencing the minds of his pupils for good or otherwise. He leaves a lasting impression upon those placed under his care.

But after all teachers are only human and they cannot be thought more wicked than other men if enthusiasm in their work is animated or restrained largely by mercenary attractions.

But what are the facts? In hundreds of cases good teachers have to be content with a miserable pittance in order to compete with inferior teachers in the matter of securing schools. This is a most suicidal business. The government has abolished supplementary allowances altogether. A large proportion of the school districts have followed this example. No stimulus remains for healthy, active work in the schoolroom—little inducement for self improvement. As a matter of fact it too often happens that the commendable efforts of a teacher in fitting himself for his work are neither recognized nor appreciated, much less remunerated, by the general public. The result is that nine tenths of our teachers look upon the profession as only a stepping stone, from which in a year or two they will rise to something, if not higher, at least more lucrative. With this prospect in view, and under financial circumstances such as those in which most teachers are placed, is it not too much to expect that teachers in this province, like other men not anxious to attend merely for self improvement, will incur the expense of attending the Summer School of Science, or any similar institution, merely to fit themselves more thoroughly for a profession, which at present, offers them such meagre inducements and in which they do not intend to continue.
